SENATE OF THE STATE OF LOUISIANA. FRIDAY, JANUARY 23, 1886.

The Senate met in executive session. Present, the Hon. Albert Voorhees, Lieutenant Governor and President of the Senate; and Messrs. Anderson, Armstrong, Brule, Cooze, Cooley, Duval, Egan, Ellis, Follis, Gordon, Hough, Kenner, Lott, Munday, Newton, Polk, Poydras, Scruggs, Taylor, Welch and Wilcox—22 Senators.

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the Constitution, and whose appointments are not otherwise provided; provided, however, that the Legislature shall have a right to prescribe the mode of appointment to all other offices established by law.

And the Senator took the ground that if these vacancies were to be regarded as original appointments, they were incomplete, without the advice and consent of the Senate being first obtained.

The distinction between extra and regular sessions of the Senate is not made by the terms or by the spirit of the Constitution, which contemplates and requires the advice and consent of the Senate to all appointments; not otherwise provided for, whenever that advice and consent can be obtained.

On motion of Mr. Kenner, the whole subject matter was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

On motion of Mr. Polk, it was ordered that the constitutional objections to the confirmation of the commissions under consideration be referred to a select committee of three, with instructions to confer with the Governor on the subject, and apprise him, on behalf of the Senate, of the course adopted by them, and to solicit from him such suggestions for remedy as may be deemed advisable.

Mr. Mohan, from the select committee on pardon, to whom was referred the pardon of William Harrison, who was tried and convicted before the First District Court of New Orleans for the crime of burglary, and sentenced on the 23rd day of December, 1884, to five years' imprisonment at hard labor, and to pay the costs of prosecution, submitted an adverse report.

On motion to concur in the recommendation of his Excellency the Governor, in said pardon, the roll was called, and the following was the result of the vote: Yeas—Messrs. Abney, Anderson, Brownlee, Campbell, Follis, Lott, Mohan and Newton of Jackson—8 Senators.

On motion of Mr. Brule, the executive session adjourned, and the doors were ordered to be reopened.

OSCAR ARROYO, Assistant Secretary of the Senate. PROCLAMATION BY J. MADISON WELLS, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF LOUISIANA.

Whereas, an act of the General Assembly, approved March 28th, 1886, provides that the election shall be held throughout the State, on the 31st day of May, 1886, for the offices hereinafter named, to-wit:

- One District Attorney in and for the parish of Orleans. One District Attorney in and for each Judicial District throughout the State. One Sheriff in and for each parish. One Clerk of Court in and for each parish, except for the parish of Orleans. One Clerk of Court each, for the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth District Courts in and for the parish of Orleans. One Assessor in and for each parish, except the parish of Orleans. Four Assessors in and for the city of New Orleans. One Assessor in and for the parish of Orleans, and one Assessor in and for each parish. An equal number of Justices of the Peace and Constables, according to the districts and wards in each parish, as established by law. Four State Tax Collectors, one for each district in and for the city of New Orleans. One State Tax Collector in and for the Right Bank parish of Orleans. One State Tax Collector in and for the parish of Jefferson.

Now, therefore, I do issue this my proclamation commanding all Sheriffs, Commissioners of Election, and other officers therein concerned, to hold said election on the day aforesaid named, to-wit: the FIRST MONDAY OF MAY, 1886, for the various offices as before going enumerated, and for so doing this will be their sufficient warrant and authority without further notice.

Said election to be conducted and returns thereon to be made in all respects according to the provisions of the Constitution and laws in such cases made and provided.

For the guidance and information of voters I annex hereto the qualifications of voters as established by law. "Every white male who has attained the age of twenty-one years, and who has been a resident of the State twelve months next preceding the election, and the last three months thereof in the parish in which he offers to vote, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, shall have the right of vote."
