

New Orleans Money Market.

West has induced sellers to hold more firmly to their stocks, until the movement has become more fully developed. Sales since our last report of 500 bbls, of which 300 extra at \$12, and 200 extra at \$12 1/2. The week's receipts amount to 850 bbls, and the exports to 9614 bbls.

Cons.—The market opened quiet at last week's closing rates. White Corn has continued firm, but during the week there has been a decline of 50¢ per bushel on yellow. The receipts have been moderate, with a fair demand, mostly for shipment to Alabama and Texas; but the market closed firm, with an upward tendency. The week's sales amount to 61,900 sacks, of which 6190 were sold to-day in the following lots, viz: 300 white at 95¢; 400 and 700 yellow at 87 1/2¢; 400 yellow at 85¢; and 230 yellow sold at 87 1/2¢; 100 white mixed at 90¢; and 1300 do. at 92¢. The week's receipts amount to 65,750, and the exports were 14,647 sacks.

Oats.—Have continued in fair demand throughout, while prices have been ruling steady in favor of holders, and we notice an advance of 3¢ per bushel during the past commercial week. The stock on hand and receipts have only been moderate, while most of an average amount has been doing. The sales amount to 19,284 sacks at prices ranging from 53¢ to 58¢ per bushel, the latter figure being the closing rate; 10,860 sacks were sold in lot since our last, and of these: 300 at 56¢; 200 at 57 1/2¢; and 140 at 58¢. The week's receipts comprise 3074, and the exports 636 sacks.

Hay.—There has been a fair demand done during the week in this article, but mostly at very low figures. The supply on hand is ample, while offering rates during the latter portion of the week did not meet the views of holders, the latter feeling confident that higher prices would be realized soon. The transactions for the week amount to 5655 bales at prices ranging from \$21.62 1/2 per ton, the latter figure being the closing rate this evening. There were sales to-day of 200 bales at \$22 1/2 per ton.

Wool.—The market opened very quiet, but firm at last week's closing rates. The supply was limited and in the hands of a few dealers, who were not disposed to sell at quotations very different from previous quotations, viz: \$3.00 to \$3.50 per lb, while most of the stock on hand was stored, within the past few days. Some large lots have been received, however, and the market became weaker, but to-day, owing to a more active demand, the movement exhibited considerable excitement, and prices were more liberal. The closing figures being \$1.25 to \$1.30 per lb for retail lots. The sales for the week amount to 1400 bales, including 1080 bales sold to-day in lots as follows: 400 on private terms; 800 at \$1.25; and 100 at \$1.25 per lb. The week's receipts amount to 4743 bales, and exports to 106 bales.

Woolen Goods.—Have continued in active retail demand throughout the week, while prices have remained firm at 1 1/2¢ for shawls, 1 1/2¢ to 1 3/4¢ for ribbons, 1 1/2¢ to 1 3/4¢ for clear shawls, and sugar corded hams at 35¢. The week's sales amount to 12 tons, hams and 165 cases of shawls and ribbons, at the above quotations. The transactions for the day amount to 67 cases, as follows: 25 of shawls at 1 1/2¢, 4 do. at 1 1/4¢, 10 cases ribbed at 1 1/2¢, 14 and 12 do. of clear shawls at 1 1/2¢. The week's receipts amount to 4735 tons, hams and 13 boxes sides, and exports 25 tons, hams and 12 cases sides.

Woolen Goods.—There has been a fair retail demand during the week, while prices have remained firm at last week's closing rates, viz: 2 1/2¢ per lb for prime in fibers, and 2 1/2¢ to 2 3/4¢ per lb for prime in fibers, and 2 1/2¢ to 2 3/4¢ per lb for prime in fibers, and 2 1/2¢ to 2 3/4¢ per lb for prime in fibers.

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Commercial Intelligence.

Cotton.—The movement today has been restricted to 2145 bales, at prices steadily tending to yesterday's outside quotations. The demand was active and steady throughout, while the supply was, if anything, of a more limited character than heretofore. In fact, there are very few total exports for the week in 15,380 bales, against 34,044 bales last week, and 8236 bales the week previous; and the stock on hand and on shipment not cleared, this evening, is 147,224 bales, against 157,308 bales last week, and 165,044 bales at the close of the previous week. The exports for the week included 9134 bales for Liverpool, 1231 bales for Havre, 1424 bales for New York, 1071 bales for Boston, and 113 bales for Vera Cruz.
