WASHINGTON, August 9.-The Herald's Ottawa special says that in the Canadian Parliament yesterday, Mr. Mackenzie, in a speech, alluded to the fact that the Fort Erie campaign, when the most disastrous of our wars, was waged, but that the British had killed several white men near Fort Erie and stolen a great number of cattle.
