France and Mexico. The following is a translation of the imperial decree of the new convention between France and Mexico, signed at the imperial city of Mexico, on July 29th, and published in the Monitor of September 13th.

Article I. A convention relating to the assignment of the French consular offices in Mexico, and the execution of the same, will remain in force until the date of the expiration of the term of office of the consular officers named in the annexed list.
