LETTER FROM ST. LOUIS.

Special Correspondence of the New Orleans Crescent.

St. Louis, Oct. 19, 1886.

Business of all kinds has been quite brisk for the past week, but not more so than is usually expected at this season of the year.

On the levee, freight for the lower river is plenty at nominal rates. The river at this point is declining, with about six feet in the channel at Cairo. Large boats experience much difficulty in getting out, even with half a load.

A serious boiler explosion took place on Wednesday at the furnace turning establishment of Youkibou, on Franklin avenue. Three men were killed, and as many more injured. The building was blown to atoms, some of the fragments being picked up two or three squares distant.

The cause of the catastrophe is not definitely ascertained, though it is reported that the boiler was an old and patched one. The frequent occurrence of such explosions calls loudly on our authorities for the appointment of a boiler inspector.

In social circles, the grand caucus ball, in aid of the Southern Relief Association, has been the absorbing topic this week. The ball took place on Wednesday night, and the large warehouse, in which the fair is held, was crowded with the beauty and fashion of the city.
