THE will of President McKinley was admitted to probate on Monday, September 30. In pursuance of the wishes of Mrs. McKinley, upon her signed recommendation, Judge Wm. R. Day and Secretary George B. Cortelyou were appointed administrators. The joint administrators' bond of \$100,000 was filed. Judge Day and Secretary Cortelyou say the amount of personal property of the late president was about \$140,000 and real estate about \$70,000, aggregating \$210,000. President McKinley was not as wealthy as the general public anticipated.

THERE is much excitement over the prospects of establishing the beet sugar industry in the Salt river valley. Meetings have been held this week at Glendale, Mesa, Tempe and Phoenix, and much enthusiasm is evinced by the farmers of that section. Should this industry be established in the fertile valley of the Salt it will add much to the present great resources of Arizona.

WORK was commenced this week on the erection of a new Harvey house at Seligman. If this is anything by which to judge, the division point will not at present be removed. Still, Harvey houses are conducted along the line at places where division points are not located, and Williams is still, and always will be, the natural point for the same.

THE name of the Santa Fe & Grand Canyon railway has been changed to "The Grand Canyon Railway Company" and will henceforth operate under this title.

It is semi-officially stated that the net earnings of the United States steel corporation for the past six months amounted to \$54,000,000, and the newspaper comment is that there is still something left for the corporation after Schawb's salary is paid. He must receive a trifle more than the average steelworker.

ACCORDING to the latest reports the owners of the Last Chance mine in the Grand Canyon have a veritable mint. Development work is progressing rapidly and with it the ore values only increase. The mines of this section are bound to be good producers and the News is glad to see such active work being engaged in.

THE city's new business blocks are growing rapidly, and from present appearances, will be beauties when completed. Several are finished and occupied at present, several more will be ready about November 1, and all will be completed before the winter months arrive.

MRS. MCKINLEY'S condition remains the same. She takes her usual outings and appears to be improving in health. All America hopes for her complete recovery.

Arizona's Population Classified.

The following facts regarding Arizona are taken from the latest census bulletin for 1900.

Total population, 122,931, males, 71,792; females, 51,136; native born, 93,699; foreign born, 24,233.

Total white population, 92,943; native white, 70,508.

Negroes—Males, 1,363; females, 484.

Chinese—Males, 1,367; females, 32.

Japanese—Males, 264; females, 17.

Indians—Males, 13,551; females, 13,929.

Arizona has 44,981 men of voting age.—Arizona Blade.

The annual report of President Ripley, of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway, for the fiscal year ending July 30, last, shows the total earnings to be \$54,474,822, an increase of \$8,242,744 over the previous year. The total operating expenses were \$32,262,945, an increase over the previous year of \$4,741,445. The net earnings were \$22,211,877, an increase of \$8,501,298, after deducting the interest charged on \$8,029,476, there remained \$14,183,401 applicable for dividends and surplus purposes.
