Heavy Snow Storms.

The storm which has been raging throughout the northern intermountain country struck Salt Lake on the 26th with a suddenness and fury which startled the residents. From a dead calm the wind increased to a velocity of fifty miles an hour in a very few minutes, bringing with it a blinding snow-storm which raged with the fury of a blizzard for over two hours. The storm came from the northwest, and although comparatively short, it was one of the severest felt in that section for years.

The storm struck Helena, Montana, on the same day and with the same startling suddenness. Apparently a calm, warm morning was transformed almost in a twinkling into a howling blizzard. Snow fell rapidly and the wind blew forty-five miles an hour. There is a general storm over western and central Montana. Near Missoula Conductor Charles King was blown from the top of his train and killed. King had charge of a freight train and was trying to reach the caboose over the top of the train when the accident occurred.
