WOOLGROWERS' MEETING

Good Work Accomplished by the Association—A Few Objections.

The sheepmen of northern Arizona were well represented at the meeting of the Arizona Woolgrowers' Association, held at the courthouse in Flagstaff, says the Coconino Sun.

The forenoon was taken up by discussion of various questions affecting the industry, in which all present, whether members of the association or not, were requested to take part.

In the afternoon, after reports of the officers and committees, the president addressed the association, reviewing the work of the past, showing conclusively that the organization, the united effort only possible by such organization, had more than once saved its members thousands of dollars, if not the complete annihilation of the industry in the territory.

General discussion followed. The officers were directed to continue the membership in the National Livestock Association, with a representation of 200,000 head of sheep, and to become members of the reorganized National Woolgrowers' Association, with same representation.

The inspection of sheep for marks, under orders of the territorial livestock sanitary board, brought on a spirited discussion, in which, with one exception, those present were entirely united in opposition, and all agreed that the fee of one and one-half cents per head, as fixed by the said board, was extremely exorbitant.

The following resolution was proposed and adopted without a dissenting vote:
"Resolved, That we, the Arizona Woolgrowers' Association, are opposed to the inspection of sheep for marks and brands, under existing laws, as impracticable and without protection to the woolgrower, and because the cost to the owners and damage to the sheep will be many times greater than any benefit accruing to the woolgrowers."

After the meeting of the general association the western division met and transacted their usual routine of business and elected the following officers: Directors: Gosney, Pollock, Francis, Hutchinson, and W. W. Perkins. Delegates to meeting of the general association for one year and until their successors are elected: Harry Henderson, H. C. Lockett, J. C. Muder-shack, J. X. Woods, Harry Scorse, E. B. Newman, W. H. Campbell and John Noble.

Since the above meeting the following letter has been received by Mr. T. F. Holden, livestock inspector, from H. Harrison, secretary of the territorial livestock sanitary board:
"Mr. T. F. Holden, Williams, Ariz.—Dear Sir: The following rule has been formulated by the chairman of the board, in pursuance to a unanimous vote of the board held in Phoenix under date of July 7, in which he was authorized to act for the board in the matter of adjusting the differences regarding the inspection fee for sheep, as expressed in a communication from the Arizona Woolgrowers' Association, under date of June 6th, and a resolution forwarded by one E. S. Gosney, who signs himself as chairman and president of said Wool-

growers' Association and its meeting, under date of July 3d:

"It is ordered that in future, as in the past, all shipments of sheep, in common with other livestock, are subject to inspection, as required in Par. 3001, R. S. A., 1901, and that the inspector making such inspection shall, before giving a certificate of the same to the person for whom the inspection is made, and before delivering the shipment permit to the transportation company (or its agent), collect from the person in charge of such stock the sum of three-fourths of a cent per head for all such sheep or goats so inspected. This rule will have no bearing in the matter of payments they have already made under the previous order of the board, as that order remains in full force and effect until these instructions are in the hands of the inspector."

This week a delegation of sheepmen from the Arizona Wool Growers' Association, accompanied by a representative of the livestock sanitary board, called upon Attorney-General E. W. Wells at Phoenix and that gentleman gave it as his opinion that the ruling of the board with regard to the collection of even three-fourths of a cent tax for inspection was illegal. There is little doubt now but that hereafter no charge of this kind will be made.

Flagstaff "Gems" and "Sun" Beams.

F. S. Breen has secured a commodious office in the Pollock block and is having it fitted up this week in first-class shape.

Sometime between the 3d and 6th of July the residence of Andy Hansen, at his ranch south of Riordan, was destroyed by fire, together with its contents. The fire is supposed to have been the work of an incendiary. The loss is estimated at \$1000.

The government is investigating the merits of the mining locations in the Grand Canyon of Arizona for the purpose of determining what claims are being developed and what claims are being held for other purposes under the guise of mining locations.

Babbitt Bros. received a carload of fine yearling bulls Wednesday. The bulls are 32 in number, the herd being Herefords and Durhams, the Herefords being in the largest number. They are very fine animals, and will be utilized on the Babbitt's range. The stock were shipped from Dodge City, Kansas, under charge of Charles Clark.

June 3rd the new naturalization law enacted by the last congress took effect, and hereafter no applicant for the privileges of citizenship will be able to take out his papers unless he forswears all anarchistic beliefs, tendencies and connections. To secure his papers of naturalization the foreigner must hereafter make his solemn affidavit that he has no leaning toward political or personal views antagonistic to all organized forms of government. Also he must not be in sympathy in any way with those individuals who seek to rid the country of political evils by striking to death its officials.

Pursuant to law, the board of supervisors met today as a board of equalization. Present: Chairman Babbitt, members Martin and Cornish.

On motion, the board adjourned to July 7, 1903.
