Attention, Voters!

It is not at all difficult for voters to register their will with respect to men and measures by using Australian ballot provided by the laws of Arizona and yet a large per cent of Arizona voters fail to do this. Voting is done hurriedly and carelessly and the election judges are obliged to reject the vote for candidates, if not the whole ballot. To cast a ballot which registers the voters will be a mark of both intelligence and care.

Take the ballot which will be put into the hand of Arizona voters Nov. 7th for instance. The names of the candidates for Justice of the Supreme Court do not appear on the ballot under the party name but are placed in a non-partisan list at the top of the ticket. The careless voter will not note this and will probably lose his vote for Supreme Judge. Look for the name of Henry D. Ross and put a cross after it and your vote for him will be counted.

The names for Tax Commissioner are also placed above the party name. So to vote for Charles R. Howe for Tax Commissioner his name must be looked for at the top of the ticket. Find his name and put a cross after it and your vote for Howe will be counted.

There need be no haste in the booth. Study your ballot well and be sure you are right before making the cross. Your ballot is too important to be lost thru haste or carelessness.

Can Demagogy Win?

When politicians have no issues they resort to demagogy to win elections. They attempt to deceive the voters by lies or half truths. They appeal to passion, hoping to gain support from those who are apt to act without thinking.

The republican party is in such a position this fall that republicans can hope to win only thru demagogy. They have no issue and so they resort to misrepresentation and to appeals to passions or false pride. The story of the Lusitania is retold in harrowing detail; the suffering of the Belgians is recounted; the loss of life in Mexico is exaggerated and the horrors of bandit murders are made as vivid as possible.

The constructive work of the democratic administration is ridiculed and falsified and dire calamity is predicted for the country, if the reins of government are not turned over to republicans. In short the arts of the demagogue are used to the fullest to win votes for a party without issue and without principles.

Demagogy has had its victories in the past but it is hardly possible that it will win this fall.

Prohibition Hurt by Folly of Its Friends

The News has had occasion to call attention to the illogical stand taken by the Woman's party in making war on President Wilson with the probable result that they will hurt the cause which they claim is very dear to them: Woman's enfranchisement. The News wishes now to call attention to the equally illogical and harmful stand taken by the Temperance Federation of Arizona in making war on Henry D. Ross, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Arizona because he wrote and concurred in the "personal use" decision. The Federation has gone so far in its misguided zeal that it has tried to suppress the letter of the former Chief Justice of Alabama commending the decision of the Supreme Court of Arizona and suggesting how prohibition in Arizona may be made effective. In the personal use decision the Supreme Court of

Arizona makes the same suggestion and the Temperance Federation has profited by it and had the amendment on which we shall vote Nov. 7, framed in accordance therewith. The prohibition cause needs to be saved from its friends.

The letter of Ex-Chief Justice Weakley is a valuable contribution to the cause of prohibition and is submitted below.

Judge Weakley's Letter

Birmingham, Alabama,
October 2nd 1916.

Dear Sir:
I understand that a prohibition campaign is on in Arizona for the adoption of the proposed Prohibition Amendment to meet the decision of the Supreme Court of that State in the Sturgeon case, and of course I will be greatly pleased to see the amendment succeed, as I have been fighting for prohibition in Alabama since 1907 to the present time. I briefed and argued the Whittle case before our Supreme Court, involving the receipt and possession clause of our anti shipping bill, and secured a decision from the Supreme Court of Alabama sustaining that law.

Alabama law would have been Sustained

I have read the decision of the Supreme Court of Arizona in the Sturgeon case and it is evident from the opinion of the Court that had there been in Arizona a law against the receipt and possession of liquor as there is in Alabama it would have been sustained by the Court. In that opinion the Supreme Court goes as far toward restraining and restricting liquor shipments for personal use as any Supreme Court in the country. The court expressly approved the Idaho decision in Experte Crane, and the principal laid down in the Sturgeon case would support a statute or constitutional amendment so framed as to harmonize and fit in with the Webb-Kenyon law.

Opinion Approved

After reading the opinion of the Supreme Court in the Sturgeon Case, I am satisfied that the case was correctly decided upon the ground that the amendment did not fall within the terms of the Webb-Kenyon law, but I am furthermore of the opinion that the court laid down principals that should be entirely satisfactory to prohibitionists and that should render it easy to meet the difficulty, either by adopting the proposed amendment or by having a statute directed against receipt and possession of liquor, since such statute would put into operation the Webb-Kenyon Law. This principle has been precisely so decided by the Supreme Court of Alabama and by the Supreme Court of North Carolina and very recently by a majority, or four out of five judges, of the South Carolina Supreme Court. The opinion in the Sturgeon case was very carefully prepared and is well supported by the authorities which it cites, and I am satisfied that no just ground of complaint can be made against the court, or any member thereof, by Prohibitionists, on account of that decision.

Street Signs not so Expensive

So great an advantage would the marking of the streets be to Williams that the News must think that the only reason that the matter has not been attended to is that no one has had the matter up and make a propoganda for it. The expense is not an objection tho it may have seemed to many

that it would be. The News has taken the matter up with Williams experts and has been able to make an estimate that is surprisingly low. The material and work will be furnished by Williams men at the estimated cost.

The News has prepared the estimate on the assumption that wood would be used for the street signs. Wood will last for several years and is the cheapest material to be had.

The News has provided in the estimate for marking Railroad, Bill Williams, Grant, Sherman, Sheridan and Hancock Avenues and Taber, First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Streets. The marking may be extended as the growth of the town demands it.

72 signs would be needed to mark the streets and avenues contemplated. These signs, 20 inches by 5 inches, painted ready for lettering, would be furnished for 11 cents apiece. The lettering would be done for 3 cents a letter. The signs would be put in place for 10 cents apiece. The statement of cost would then be as follows:

72 painted boards at 11c	\$ 7.92
654 letters at 3c	19.62
72 signs put up at 10c	7.20
Total cost	34.72

The cost, then, would be \$35.00 in round numbers. This is a mere bagatelle. It is fair to presume that the Town council would willingly contribute one-half of the amount and the rest could easily be raised by subscription.

The News will gladly do its share to bring about this improvement which will be a convenience to every body and add dignity to the Town.

KIBBEY A MAN OF DEEDS

SOME OF THE THINGS JUDGE KIBBEY HAS DONE FOR THE PEOPLE

On the bench, Judge Kibbey was first to promulgate the doctrine that "The water belongs to the land using it,"—thus striking the shackles from the land-owner and setting him free from the exactions of the "middle man" canal companies. The Kibbey doctrine now prevails throughout the west.

The U. S. Reclamation act was intended for the sole benefit of settlers on public lands and not for settled communities like the Salt Kiver valley and the Yuma valley, and the law officers of the Interior department at first held that the law could not be made to apply to settled communities. But Judge Kibbey, as counsel to the landowners of the Salt River valley, devised a plan to get the benefits of the law for them, and he put the plan through at Washington.

As justice of the supreme court, as a legislator, as attorney-general, and as governor, he made a record for high-minded patriotism, for non-partisanship in office, and for remarkable achievement for the public good.

As governor, he vetoed a local option bill which would have inflicted liquor-selling road houses upon rural "dry" communities.

He forced the passage of a law putting and end to public gambling—he being bitterly opposed in this by democratic politicians.

Through all the courts, to the supreme court of the United States, he fought to compel the great corporations to pay more taxes, and won.
