THE RECONSTRUCTION CONVENTION.

FOURTY-SEVENTH DAY.

FRIDAY, JAN. 24, 1868.

Convention met at 10 A. M. General McMillen presiding; sixty-seven delegates present.

The order of the day was taken up. Smith, of Orleans, in speaking upon the substitute offered by Judge Cooley, moved to amend by adding "and registered enemies."

Upon motion of Judge Cooley, Newham's amendment was laid on the table. Wickliffe, of Orleans, offered a substitute, excluding from the elective franchise and from holding office, all disfranchised by acts of Congress.

The speaker discussed the question at considerable length, assuming the course of President Johnson and upholding that of Congress, upon whose action his amendment was based.

Mr. Packard, of Algiers, regretted that the delegate preceding him had failed to advance any proposition showing why his amendment should take precedence of that previously offered by the speaker.

Mr. Packard, in the fifth section, had directed that the franchise should be conferred upon colored men, but it was never intended to disfranchise others.

Mr. Jones, of Orleans, said it made his heart sick within him to find the convention voting down the disfranchising registered enemies. To enfranchise that class of men who had originated this rebellion, is simply to acknowledge that rebellion was right and that treason is respectable.

Mr. Barrett, of Union, agreed with Smith, of Orleans, that he had made up his mind to vote for disfranchising nobody but any one who is to be deprived of voting the registered enemies should certainly be included.

Mr. Jones, of Feliciana, desired to know since when treason had become honorable; since when the punishment of rebellion had been wiped out from the Constitution.

Mr. Jones, of Feliciana, offered the following amendment thereto: No person, excluded under the provisions of the military reconstruction bill of Congress, or any person named to accept the privilege of holding office, shall be entitled to vote, or be eligible to any office of trust or profit in this State.
