FROM WASHINGTON.

A Supreme Court Judge and the Maryland

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—This evening's Express

says at a private gathering of gentlemen of both

political parties, one of the justices of the

Supreme Court spoke very freely concerning the

reconstruction measures of Congress, and declared

in the most positive terms that all the laws were

unconstitutional, and that the court would be sure

to pronounce them so. Some of his friends near

him suggested that it was quite indiscreet for him

to speak so positively, when he at once repeated

the views in a emphatic manner, saying that the

homeless. Loss \$30,000. It is feared these fires

are incendiary.

FROM EUROPE.

A Side of Vesuvius Tumbles out—A French-

man Afraid of Russia and America—

France-Italian Relations—A General Cat-

astrophe—Arrest of a Fenian Head Center—

Dr. Newman Hall and the Alabama Claims

Financing of Member of Parliament.

NAPLES, Jan. 30.—The side of Vesuvius, oppo-

site the gate of the Castello Nuovo, one of the

fortifications of the city, tumbled outwards, bur-

ying several houses and passing carriages, and fill-

ing the road with rocks.

The number killed unknown.

PARIS, Jan. 30.—During the debate in the Sen-

ate on the army bill, M. Chevalier opposed the

bill on peace grounds, but said that all Europe

should unite to resist Russia and America, whose

rapid growth of power threaten to overshadow

the continent.

Marshal Neill called these views absurd, hav-

ing been refuted by every event since the Crimean

war.

The bill finally passed the Senate.

A coup d'etat in Italy is feared; her relations

with France are less cordial.

Prussia sustains the temporal power of the pope

to conciliate her Catholic subjects.

A general Catholic Council is sure to meet in

Rome in November.

FLORENCE, Jan. 29.—The Unita Cattolica says

that an agent from the American government has

arrived at Rome on a secret mission, in which he

is to be supported by Admiral Farragut, who will

soon arrive.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—Mareca Ward, a Fenian lead-

er, was arrested in Cork last night.

Rev. Newman Hall, in an address delivered in

Spurgeon's tabernacle, urged Lord Stanley to

bring the Alabama claims to a speedy settlement.

BERLIN, Jan. 30.—Twelve, the member of

parliament, arrested sometime since for alleged

improper language in debate, was discharged

with a slight fine. It is thought the judicial

position taken by parliament that members ought

not to be held accountable in any other place for

words spoken in debate, has contributed but in a

small degree to this merely nominal punishment.
