FLORIDA POLITICS.

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Pending the proceedings yesterday Summer moved to proceed immediately to the consideration of the articles. Motion carried—18 to 10. Ayes—Cameron, Conkling, Conness, Drake, Hart, Morgan, Nye, Pomeroy, Stewart, Thayer, Tipton, Williams, Wilson and Yates.

The American Medical Association meets next year at New Orleans. Dr. Wm. O. Baldwin, of Montgomery, Ala., was elected president. In receiving him on behalf of the Association, Dr. Gossett said: "I welcome you as the representative of our long lost brethren. May God bless you, God bless your people. God bless all of us!" Dr. Baldwin replied at length and was frequently applauded.

Judge Chase's connection with adjournment was stated last night. Mr. Conkling had been fixed to 10 o'clock on Monday. Chase said it would place him in an embarrassing position to frame the questions, and therefore he should like to have the advice of the Senate on the subject, and would be obliged to them if they would adjourn until 10 o'clock, instead of 11 Monday. Adopted.

The South Carolina committee, with protest against the Constitution, were before the reconstruction committee today. Stevens received them with the chilling remark that what the protest claimed as grievances they regarded as virtues. Col. Thomas addressed the committee, making the points that, while the people would not voluntarily submit to negro supremacy, that while they would be compelled to submit to the yoke, there could be no real peace until it was removed. The question of taxation seemed to impress the committee seriously. Stevens suggested the plan of allowing property holders to fix the taxation. Many Southerners were present in the committee room, and the committee are hopeful of some modification of the most objectionable features of the proposed Constitution. The articles are favorably received, and their views are fully endorsed by representative men here of the Northern Democracy.

House.—A number of private bills were considered, after which Stevens reported his bill admitting Arkansas. He considered the Constitution unexceptional, and did not desire to debate the bill. Several members complained that they had never seen the Constitution. Baker, though having the petition, doubted the propriety of the congress to enforce the stipulation regarding suffrage. He said business of this kind should not be done hurriedly, nor should the bill pass until the Constitution was examined. Stevens said there was nothing in the Constitution objectionable to a man who favored freedom. Stevens demanded the previous question which was recorded, and the main question was ordered. Stevens having the floor yielded it for fifteen minutes to Woodward, who never having seen the Constitution, declined speaking. Beck stated that if time was allowed him he would demonstrate that the Constitution never received the votes of the majority of the people of Arkansas, and that he would show how they rushed the bill through. Beck said the franchise and educational clauses were particularly objectionable. The bill finally passed—110 to 23. Baker, Loan, Spalding and Williams, of Pennsylvania, voted in the affirmative. A resolution declared the officers recently elected in South Carolina to be the provisional government of that State. Referred to the reconstruction committee. Peine reported a bill admitting South Carolina, which was ordered to a second reading. A full cabinet meeting held to-day.

The radicals have nominated Sayles J. Bowen, city postmaster, for mayor.

The Republican congressional committee has advised from Florida that the Constitution is adopted and the legislature radical.

Conservative State Nominations—Mayor of Norfolk—New Republican Ticket.

RICHMOND, May 8.—The conservative convention today nominated Bolt, E. Withers, of Lynchburg, governor; Gen. James Walker, of Pulaski, lieutenant governor; J. L. Mays, Jr., of Spotsylvania, attorney general, and Marmaduke Johnson, of Richmond, congressman at large. The vote for governor was—Withers 23, J. B. Baldwin 49. Withers and Walker are eligible under the reconstruction acts of Congress, but not under the test oath of the new Constitution.

Charlotte Harby said the convention is not likely to do anything. Two hundred and eighty-three municipal officers have been appointed by Gen. Schofield since January 1st.

FROM EUROPE.

English Politics—Another Royal Alliance—Magdala Expunged—Gen. Nagle and Other Penalties Released—Mr. Gladstone's Third Resignation—The Irish Church Question.

LONDON, May 7.—Large attendance in Commons. Gladstone said it was proposed, after the House had acted on the resolves, to offer a suspensory act, to remain in force till August 9th. He then moved the second resolve.

Some of the liberal members of the Republican convention have gotten up a ticket with H. M. Bowden, of Norfolk, for governor, Dr. Bayne, a negro, of Norfolk, for lieutenant governor, and F. H. Bowden, the present incumbent, for attorney general. The ticket is not likely to amount to anything. Two hundred and eighty-three municipal officers have been appointed by Gen. St. Domingo.—Business is utterly prostrated at the country seat. Bazin brought no specie with him.

HAVANA, May 8.—Advices from Lagayra state that the revolution is increasing. The ministry are resigning at St. Domingo. In several of the States congress had not assembled for want of a quorum. The Danish man-of-war Damaris was at Lagayra demanding redress for the injury sustained by the Danish merchants at St. Thomas. With the unsettled condition of affairs in Venezuela.

A Spanish man-of-war is said to be watching the American bark Alice Ball, at St. Thomas, with orders to take her or sink her at all hazards whenever she leaves port. [Note by the reporter: Information has been received that the Alice Ball, loaded with munitions for Peru, eluded the Spaniards, and sailed for her destination.] Sailed: Steamship Gayace, for New Orleans.

REPTORIAL PRIVILEGES.—A motion for a new trial has been filed in the Third District Court, in the suit in which it was lately determined by the verdict of the jury that the Pontchartrain Railroad Company have the right to discriminate in the use of the public patronage, the worst and most objectionable of the temporalities of all the dignities of the Church of Ireland.

The suit returned to was instituted by the Elphinstone Towboat Company against the railroad company for \$100,000 damages, for refusing to carry freight for the steamer Greole as low as the freight of the Morgan line steamers was carried.

DEMISSAL OF THE CHARGE AGAINST GOVERNOR BAKER.—Chief clerk of the court in taking the oath of office, preferred against the chief magistrate of Louisiana by a freedman, who swore that Judge Baker had, in 1867, assisted in preventing the passage of federal subpoenas through Bayou Lafourche by his clerk, John B.
