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"CIVIL LAW SUPREME."

The announcement by the district commander that military supervision of State affairs has ceased, and that civil law is supreme, is almost startling.

Assuredly every good citizen will heartily respond to his desire that an era of good feeling and of mutual forbearance, an era of tranquil and prosperous days, will be the sequel to the extraordinary transition which his order signalizes.

Gen. Duchann, in the most public and solemn form, declares that "the provisions of the reconstruction acts of Congress cease to operate in Louisiana on this date"; that "military authority will no longer be exercised under the reconstruction acts in said State"; that this event "restores Louisiana to her former position among the other States, and to all her rights under the Constitution"; and that hereafter his military subordinates will not "interfere in civil affairs, unless upon a proper application by the civil authorities to preserve the peace, or under instructions duly received from the commanding general."

Thus we have the explicit, unqualified, and formal testimony of the authority charged with the execution of the reconstruction acts, that these acts, completely executed, have expired, and that the State occupies her former position in the Union, and is divested of none of her rights under the Constitution.

It is devoutly to be hoped, however, that no occasion will arise for invoking the interference of the federal military authority, on any condition or under any pretext. Our people want peace as an indispensable requisite to prosperity.

GOVERNOR WARMOTH'S INAUGURAL.

The inaugural delivered yesterday by Gov. Warmoth is in some respects a remarkable document. In point of comprehensiveness and brevity it is almost a model.

It is to be regretted that Governor Warmoth did not take this occasion to join the friends of universal amnesty and the removal of all political disabilities for political causes. While expressing his earnest wish for the revival of prosperity and of a healthy public sentiment, he should not have forgotten how much a policy of political vindictiveness and proscription makes against both of those objects.

"We want peace and order; without it we can have no prosperity," says Gov. Warmoth. He may be assured that there is not one in the one hundred thousand of those to whom he is politically opposed who is not prepared to second him heartily in any measures which will unite the true conditions of peace and order and prosperity, security of life and property, and substantial service to the State.

THE RECONSTRUCTION LAWS INOPERATIVE. CIVIL LAW SUPREME. MILITARY TO PRESERVE THE PEACE WHEN PROPERLY CALLED ON.

HEADQUARTERS FIFTH MILITARY DISTRICT, NEW ORLEANS, La., July 13, 1868. Special Order No. 104. [Extract.]

Louisiana Declared in the Union.

By act of July 17, 1862, an enemies' property to be applied to the expenses of the war, and the debts of the United States. This was corruptly and unlawfully done, without any authority of Congress.

2. The commanding general having been officially notified of the ratification of the 14th article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States, he has the honor to inform you that the provisions of the reconstruction acts of Congress cease to operate in Louisiana from this date.

That this may be the result under the guidance of a merciful Providence, is his devout and earnest prayer. May her restoration to the benefits of our beloved Union mark the commencement of a new era of prosperity and happiness for her people.

THAD STEVEN'S NEW IMPROVEMENTS. First Additional Article.—That the said Andrew Johnson, president of the United States, did abuse the patronage of the government, which, by virtue of his office, had been intrusted to him, and did pervert it to improper and selfish purposes, inasmuch as he used it to corrupt the people of the United States, and to induce them to abandon and renounce the principles which they had solemnly agreed to support.

Second Additional Article.—That the said Andrew Johnson, being the chief executive of the United States, and being assigned by law to take care that the laws shall be faithfully executed, and having no judicial or executive functions, did, by his unconstitutional and illegal act, usurp to himself the powers of another branch of the government, and did so act and exercise the same, and in pursuance of such claim, having at the time the army and navy of the United States at his command, did establish and erect into a separate government, the so-called Confederate States of America, and which was later embraced within the boundaries of the State of North Carolina, and did by his own usurped and illegal act, appoint James Johnston, provisional governor thereof.
