PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Some twenty-five radical members of Congress had private meetings last night, at which a member of Grant's staff was present.

It was stated that the president was weakening under apprehension of impeachment in September, and would not remove Rollins.

The opinion was expressed that under yesterday's order from the war department, the Southern States would undoubtedly go Democratic, and the removal of the president so far as those present could go, was determined.

The prospect looked gloomy to most members, but Grant's election was looked upon as a patriotic necessity which must be achieved.

Reliable reports represent that Col. W. M. Smallwood will probably be appointed postmaster at New Orleans, in place of the present incumbent, who it is reported is to be suspended.

Gen. Hobart, it is understood, will be assigned as special treasury agent to run the custom house, until a successor to Mr. Kellogg has been appointed and confirmed.

This arrangement will be satisfactory to the conservative element of Louisiana so far as it is concerned.

Secretary McCulloch has issued a circular stating that parties desiring to exchange seven-thirties, due July 15th inst., for five-twenty ones must place them in mail or express, addressed to Secretary McCulloch, on or before August 1st.

Beward and Everts departed for New York on the week's absence.

The speaker appointed Butler and Beck committee to visit Prince Edward Island to report upon the prospects of a reciprocity treaty.

Secretary McCulloch apprehends mischief from the new tax bill. Stringent regulations are under preparation.

FROM ATLANTA.

Grand Democratic Demonstration—Georgia Election—Election of U. S. Senators.

ATLANTA, July 29.—There is a grand demonstration to-night by the Democratic party over the election of Hill and Miller to the Senate.

The city is splendidly illuminated, and there is an immense gathering in front of the United States Hotel.

The discourse was addressed by several speakers. Miller comes out in a fine speech for Seymour and Blair, constitutional liberty and the Union.

Gen. Gordon delivered a splendid oration, appealing to the people to stand by their country, the Union and the Constitution, as handed down by Washington and the heroes of Valley Forge, Yorktown and Monmouth.

He paid a handsome tribute to Seymour as the patriot and most gifted statesman of the country, and Blair the peerless soldier, who at the close of the war laid his sword as a sacrifice on the altar of civil law.

He lauds the Democratic platform adopted at New York as a triumph in principle and Christian in spirit. Hill will probably steer clear of parties, using his influence for the best interests of the country.

Exp.—Joshua Hill and H. V. Miller were to-day elected United States Senators on joint ballot of the Senate and House.

For the long term, Miller 119, Budget 73, scattering 20. The announcement of the election of Hill and Miller gives great satisfaction to the Democrats.

Each of the galleries upon the announcement, and the lobbies were ordered cleared.

FROM AUGUSTA, GA.

Public Indignation Over a Homicide by Police—Conservative U. S. Senators Elected.

AUGUSTA, July 29.—It has been raining for several days.

The remains of Cornelius Reed, killed by police officers, was interred this afternoon. The body was followed to the grave by a large procession of citizens and firemen.

It is understood that the jury found a verdict of murder against the police officers.

An indignation meeting will be held to-morrow against the present municipal government.

The election of Hill and Miller to the United States Senate is received with congratulations by the Democrats, who consider it a triumph of their party. The Republicans are disappointed.

FROM BALTIMORE.

Writs Served on Ben. Butler for False Imprisonment and Extortion.

BALTIMORE, July 29.—As Gen. Butler was passing through this city on Monday, en route for his home in Massachusetts, two writs, issued by the Superior Court of Maryland, were served on him.

One was a writ for false imprisonment, and the other was a writ for extortion, which says that Butler had extorted \$100,000, and the other by Kimberly & Bros., of Baltimore, to recover \$13,000, alleged to have been extorted from them by Gen. Butler when he was commanding at Fort Mifflin.

FROM COLUMBIA.

The South Carolina Legislature—Election of Chief Justice—Medical Diagnostics.

COLUMBIA, S. C., July 29.—Franklin J. Moses, father of the speaker of the House, was elected chief justice, to-day, over D. L. Carlin, United States district attorney of Charleston. Moses has never before affiliated with party and the Republicans say the party has been sold out.

Two disgusted radicals voted for Wade Hampton, and two or three others voted for Democrats. Much excitement—and no good feelings—schism widespread.

There will be an election to-morrow for the associate justices.

FROM MONTGOMERY.

The Weather—The Alabama Legislature.

MONTGOMERY, July 29.—It has been raining slightly for a day or two. Farmers are complaining of having too much rain.

The majority of the committee on disabilities reported in favor of removing all disabilities.
