Van Hout's Dispatch in Reply to the Papal Allocution.

The following is the corrected translation of the dispatch recently sent by Baron Van Hout to Baron Messynghe, at Rome, relating to the papal allocution.

"VIENNA, July 3.—I have recently received with your reports of the 22d and 23d of June the text of the allocution of the holy father in the consistory of the 22d.

"In the first place, we cannot recognize the necessity on the part of the holy father of making certain precedents in his allocution towards Austria the same procedure as towards those other countries of whose conduct the pontifical government has had to complain.

"Can indeed, a comparison be made? Have we had lands under the territory, on the possessions of the church? Have we opposed the Catholic religion or its ministers?

"Apart from such instances as do not bear on the case, we may, I believe, affirm that there is no country in Europe where the Catholic religion has so privileged a position as in Austria, despite the laws of the 25th May. This fact should have been taken into account, and the imperial government should not have been reproached in the same manner as those governments which are in opposition to the church and the Catholic religion.

"The holy see thus extends its representations to those objects which we do not wish to admit to be under its authority. It endeavors a question already too calculated to excite people's minds by placing it on a footing where political are mixed up with religious passions.

"It is not for me to judge how far this last consideration may serve to soften the feelings of the court of Rome on this point. That which in my eyes does not appear to be a consolation in remembering that more than one Catholic country obeys laws analogous to ours while at peace with the church, and above all, that there exists in Europe a great number of countries which are tenderly attached to liberty and progress have always been allied with a most decided attachment to the Catholic faith, and which, though governed by laws equally abominable, yet have been fortunate enough to meet up to the present time, to meet with the indulgent sympathies of the holy see.

"It appeared to me that the court of Rome ought to have congratulated herself at the perfect tact and reserve with which she had treated the question to the present time, but that she had treated it with a tact and reserve which she had not shown in Hungary. It did not appear desirable from any point of view to arouse fresh differences and to increase the difficulties which already exist.
