STATE LEGISLATURE. SEVENTEENTH DAY. FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 18, 1898.

The Senate met at noon. Mr. Ray from the committee on Internal Improvements, reported a favorable majority report upon House bill No. 198, authorizing the construction of a shell road in the parish of Jefferson.

By Mr. Blackburn—A resolution to declare vacant the seat of John R. Darvall, elected from the fifteenth senatorial district to fill the vacancy occurring by the election of Senator Harris to the United States Senate.

Mr. Campbell explained that he was not guided by any personal or partisan feeling, but his object was simply to preserve the force of the organic law of the State. The Constitution provides for a registration before any election shall take place.

Mr. Campbell said that as there was great difference of opinion among senators upon the question, he would move to refer the resolution to the committee on the subject.

Mr. Campbell, as a point of order, said that the bill in question was made after the motion to refer, and therefore could not be entertained.

Mr. Campbell's point was declared well taken, and the motion to refer was adopted.

Mr. Ray gave notice of a joint resolution relating to the duties of the secretary of state. The order of the day was called.

House bill No. 150—Relative to legalizing marriages. Read twice and referred to the judiciary committee.

House bill No. 202—To enable the governor, for the preservation of peace and order in the State, to appoint a constable and deputy constable for each parish.

House bill No. 11—An act to protect all persons in their civil and public rights—reported by the judiciary committee, equally divided in favor and against the bill.

Mr. Campbell called for the yeas and nays, resulting as follows: Yeas 15, nays 7.

Section 2 was read and adopted by yeas 15, and nays 7.

The third and fourth sections were read and adopted by the same vote.

On motion of Mr. Noble, this bill was recommended to the committee on the Penitentiary, with instructions to furnish a copy of the lease approved by Gen. W. H. Hancock.

An act appropriating the sum of \$250 to Wm. Pierson, late State tax collector of Union parish, as reimbursement of an equal sum erroneously paid by him in 1886 to the State treasurer.

An act appropriating the sum of \$1133 to Mr. J. Edmondson, which sum he claims for his services as colonel of militia in the year 1865, under Governor Wells.

An act authorizing the purchase of 500 copies of the Civil Code and 500 copies of the Code of Practice of Louisiana, and 100 copies of Hennen's Digest.

An act making an appropriation of \$25,000 for the removal of obstructions and wrecks of sunken steamboats on Bayou Teche, and to improve its navigation from the mouth of the river to New Iberia.

On motion the committee arose and reported in favor of the consideration of the remainder of agreed to.

An act for the relief of J. Edmondson was indefinitely postponed.

The bill recommended favorably by the committee of the whole was agreed to, considered engrossed and passed.

Leave of absence was granted until Monday next to Garretson and Raymond, of Jefferson.

Mr. St. James introduced a resolution directing the State tax collectors to receive the warrants of members and employees of the General Assembly for State taxes.

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Commercial Intelligence.

REVIEW OF THE MARKETS.—Trade generally, during the week just closing, has undergone a steady improvement. The money market has become easier.
