Paris fairs on eggs raised 227 different ways. San Francisco has five street railroads.

Princeton College has 1,000 tons of coal daily. Ireland has 206,446 acres in flax this year.

The Harper's use \$10,000 worth of paper daily. Ohio has 850 miles of canal.

The man who invented the "return ball," a toy for children, netted \$125,000 in three years.

A poor music teacher realized \$50,000 from the "ball," "When this cross war is over."

A Philadelphia Quaker has invented a "mashed plaster, ready at all times."

St. Louis has a "mashed plaster from Trieste is the finest grown in the world."

Austria exports 1,600,000 cwts. of best root sugar as a rule.

Reber, in the garden city of New York, has a factory which produces 100,000 cigars annually.

At about 480,000 cigars are smoked annually in the United States.

The New York mercantile library has 95,503 volumes, and 10,718 manuscripts.

It is said there are 20,000 Americans in and about Paris.

From the 1st of January to 21st, 151,641 immigrants arrived at New York.

The value of real and personal property in New York State, subject to taxation, is \$1,716,092,000.

The Portland works cost that city \$2,660,000.

A factory in Buffalo smelts out weekly 100 barrels of pure cider vinegar.

A factory in San Francisco turns out about 30,000 boxes of cigars and 100,000 cigars daily.

The Paris billiard tables earn \$22,000,000 per annum.

The annual receipts of the various missionary societies are estimated at \$4,525,000.

The taxable property of Boston amounts to \$4,000,000,000.

Five miles of railroad in the northwest over 7,500 miles center Chicago.

Lynn, Mass., is building a new city hall at a cost of \$3,000,000.

A gentleman in Hinds county, Miss., has realized \$250,000 this season for peaches sent to New Orleans.

The hop crop of the United States this season is estimated at 125,000 tons.

The annual production of anthracite coal in Pennsylvania is estimated at 18,000,000 bushels.

Michigan shipped 14,000,000 bushels of strawberries to Chicago this season.

The daily production of petroleum during August was 12,345 barrels.

The stock of produce on hand last September, in the United States, was \$35,975 barrels.

Heinbold, the medicine man, spends \$200,000 per annum for advertising, and clears \$300,000.

A Boston cigar dealer sells 300 cigars daily for ladies use, and thinks 1000 are smoked daily by the ladies of the city.

St. Petersburg has a Chinese library containing 11,607 volumes, 1175 wood engravings, and 275 manuscripts.

The aggregate daily circulation of the Berlin papers is 105,000 copies; of Vienna papers 89,000 copies.

The Everett mills at Lawrence, Mass., consume 20,000 pounds of cotton and 12,000 pounds of wool per week.

New York city, last year, supported 49,964 paupers, at a daily average cost of twenty-three cents each.

The annual cost of the Freedmen's Bureau is \$25,427,000. Agents, 11 surgeons and 31 clerks, whose salaries amount to \$18,000.

The steam knitting mills at Utica, N.Y., employ 85 hands, and turn out daily 200 dozen pair ladies' stockings.

During the year ending August 31st, Cincinnati shipped to New Orleans, 43,029 boxes candles, 33,448 boxes starch, and 2,916 dozen brooms.

During the week ending 9th inst., 600 cases boots and shoes were shipped from Boston to New Orleans.

In 1867 Chicago manufactured boots and shoes to the value of \$1,500,000, and sold of eastern manufacture \$4,858,266 worth.

Cincinnati shipped 264 dozen chairs and 10,795 pairs of chairs to New Orleans during the year ending 31st ult.

It is estimated that in the last twenty years Europe has expended \$5,000,000,000 on canals, railroads, telegraphs, power, coal mines, etc.

Palmer's marble palace in Chicago is to be occupied by a dry-goods firm, who pay \$52,000 net per annum for it.

The ship Ariel, the first of the tea fleet from China, made its voyage from Foo Chow to London in 55 days.

A peach grower near Painesville, Ohio, sold the present crop of his orchard of seven acres, for \$2500 on the ground.

A peach grower in California says it takes twenty tons of leaves to feed 800,000 weavers. It takes 525 cocoons to weigh a pound.

A gentleman in North Haven, Conn., planted six pounds of early rose potatoes, and gathered 3200 lbs.

At Weldon's Ridge, near Knoxville, Tennessee, the 134 rattlesnakes in two hours.

The New York Central and Hudson River Tea Company in 1889, valued at \$1,000,000 in advertising, and thus built up a large and profitable business.

In 1844 Prussia consumed 4 cwts. of best root in the manufacture of sugar. Last year 35,000,000 cwts. were consumed.

Ward cabinets in Rochester, N.Y., contain 40,000 specimens in geology and mineralogy, all plainly labeled.

A firm in New York city employs over twenty-five men in carving and ornamenting mechanical designs.

Between the years 1820 and 1859, both inclusive, the monthly expenses of the National Intelligencer were \$4000.

Paris paid \$473,000 last year for lighting the streets with gas, of the city, consuming 4,170,000 cubic feet of gas.

A British vessel sailed from Wilmington, N.C., recently, with a cargo of 3400 casks of turpentine, valued at \$55,000.

A farmer near Champlain county, Ill., has an apple orchard of 135 acres. He made last year over 25,000 gallons of cider and vinegar.

The value of farms in New England is estimated at \$74,000,000. There are 100,000 farms in the United States.
