REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Mr. Braughn, from the special committee, to inquire into the instructions of the Board of Registration to the supervisors and other actions of the board, reported that the Board of Registrars, of which William Baker is chairman, has received instructions to the various boards of supervisors throughout the State that are unwarranted in theory, and entirely beyond the law of registration.

The following is the report in full:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE THE ACTION OF BOARD OF REGISTRATION.

To the Honorable the Senate of Louisiana:

The special committee appointed in conformity to the annexed resolution beg leave to report that it has discharged its duty and beg leave to submit the following report, viz:

After the examination of various supervisors from the First, Second, Sixth and Tenth wards, your committee reported to the Board of Registrars, of which William Baker is chairman, has given instructions to the various boards of supervisors throughout the State that are unwarranted in theory and entirely beyond the law of registration.

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
