Some three hundred Winnebago had a great medicine dance a day or two since near Tunnel City. It was the largest gathering they have had for years. The dance commenced at sundown on Monday evening, and lasted till the evening following.

THE MEDICINE DANCE.

The Medicine dance among the Indians is purely religious in its origin. None but those who have been initiated are allowed to join it.

THE WIGWAM.

From my corner by the doorway could be seen the whole splendor of the great wigwam. The structure was over a hundred feet long.

THEIR DRESS.

The dress of the medicine squaws would put Madam Demorest to shame. Many were rigged out like princesses. No two were alike.

THEIR OCCUPATIONS.

These were generally of other skins, made up whole. Most of them were large and of the finest art, lined with silk and bead-work.

THE TOBACCO SMOG.

It was one of the most impressive. As the leading medicine man walks around the wood fire, dropping handfuls of tobacco in the flames, the whole camp joins in the chorus:
