REGISTRATION IN MISSOURI—THE STATE SAFE FOR THE DEMOCRACY

REGISTRATION IN MISSOURI—The State safe for the Democracy.—A St. Louis dispatch of the 14th to the Cincinnati Enquirer says: "The registration of the State is now nearly complete. In this city the increase is about twenty-five per cent. In other counties it is over one hundred per cent, and it is safe to assume that the vote of the State will be increased fifty-five per cent, that is to say, from 150,000 to 230,000. The Radical party can carry over 70,000, and the most sanguine of the party do not claim over 75,000, thus giving the State to Seymour by at least 55,000."
