COMMON COUNCIL

BOARD OF ASSISTANT ALDERMEN

REGULAR SESSION

CITY HALL, NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 22, 1888.

The board met pursuant to adjournment; present: President Kearny, Messrs. Rose, Aitken, Walker, Montgomery, Sturcken, Fisher, Pandey, Wayne, Farrell and Breen.

The reading of the minutes of last meeting was dispensed with.

The treasurer's report for the week ending Oct. 24, 1888, showing receipts \$234,195 35, expenditures \$25,316 22, balance on hand \$208,879 13, was referred to the finance committee.

Under a suspension of the rules Mr. Fisher introduced the following resolution, which was adopted by the necessary two-thirds vote on its several readings as follows:

Resolved, That by virtue of the authority vested in the Common Council of the city of New Orleans by section 128 of the statute of 1856, known as the city charter, Samuel Weeks, superintendent of the fire and alarm telegraph, be and he is hereby removed from said office because of want of confidence of said Common Council in said Samuel Weeks.

On motion of Mr. Fisher, and by unanimous consent of this board, the foregoing resolution was transmitted to the Board of Aldermen for concurrence.

The following communication from the city surveyor was read and referred to the committee on streets and landings:

SURVEYOR'S OFFICE, Room No. 19, City Hall, City of New Orleans, October 27, 1888.

Gentlemen: The petition of property holders concerning the making of banquettes on Peters and Clay streets, between Customhouse and Conti streets, has been published according to section 119 of the city charter.

No opposition has been made to said petition, consequently the Common Council can order the sale of said banquettes agreeably to the petition aforesaid.

Landry, city controller, informing the Common Council, that according to the adjudication of a contract for building a foot-bridge across the new canal, at the foot of Liberty street, to Robert Meadowcraft as principal, and John Clark, as security, for the sum of six thousand nine hundred and eighty dollars, your committee report favorably and offer the necessary resolution for adoption.

4th. Upon the report of the controller, informing the Common Council, that according to Ordinance 1024, N. S., he has adjudicated a contract for grading and shelling Eighth street from Magazine to Tchoupitoulas street, with lake shells, to J. J. O'Hara, as principal, and G. Corrojelles, security, at one dollar and ninety-five cents per running foot, your committee report favorably and offer the necessary resolution for adoption.

5th. Upon the report of the controller, informing the Common Council, that according to Ordinance 1025, N. S., he has adjudicated the contract for cleaning the streets and repairing the unpaved streets of the seventh, eighth and ninth wards of the Third District, for a term of two years, to S. W. Cotton, as principal, and E. Flood, A. C. Merkel and Y. F. Cotton, as securities, as follows, to-wit: The seventh ward, at four thousand nine hundred and seventy-five dollars per annum; the eighth ward, three thousand nine hundred dollars per annum, and the ninth ward, at three thousand seven hundred dollars per annum, your committee report favorably and offer the necessary resolution for adoption.
