THE ACT PASSED by both houses authorizing and requiring State tax collectors to receive State notes and checks of the General Assembly in payment of taxes for 1867 and 1868, has not yet received the approval of the governor.

THE CLERKS in the State auditor's office, six in number, complain that they are overworked, ill-satisfied and that they do not receive their salaries.

A NUMBER OF BROKERS in the Orleans railroad company, running from the head of Dauphin street to the city park, have applied for a charter to the Board of Directors of the District Court, ordering the board of directors of the company to show cause, on the 12th inst., why they should not be dissolved.
