THE RADICAL SWINDLE.

The returns of the election, we are sure, will show that Grant is elected by one of the largest and most infamous frauds ever perpetrated upon a free people.

Table showing election results by state: New York, 33; Delaware, 3; Maryland, 3; Kentucky, 11; California, 5; Oregon, 3; North Carolina, 3; Georgia, 3; Alabama, 8; Louisiana, 7; Arkansas, 5.

The following States were forcibly and fraudulently excluded from voting in the electoral college: Virginia, 10; Mississippi, 7; Texas, 6; West Virginia, 5.

And 159 votes are a majority of the electoral college. Radicalism has succeeded only by the total, or partial disfranchisement of the people of seven States.

IMPORTANT TO THE COTTON INTEREST.—The following copy of a letter from the acting commissioner of internal revenue, on the subject of evidence concerning the tax due on last year's cotton, has been kindly furnished to us for publication by Col. Wolfley, the assessor of this district:

OFFICE OF TREASURY DEPARTMENT, Internal Revenue, Washington, Oct. 6, '68. Sir:—In reply to yours of the 17th ult., concerning your duty with respect to cotton arrived in New York, I have to say that the attention of the committee of ways and means was called to the contents of that report which new cotton, exempt from tax, and marketable to tax, were thrown on the market together, and they were urged to recommend such legislation as would enable the proper discrimination to be made.

Before the present crop found its way into the market every bale of cotton was subject to the tax, and therefore it was not unreasonable that the holder of any bale should be required to show that the tax had been paid. Now, when much cotton is upon the market which is not subject to the tax, I do not think we are justified in calling for proof, unless there is some reasonable presumption of fraud.
