THANKSGIVING.

The most crushing blow which melancholy can inflict upon its victim, is to tell him that in his plight there is nothing which he has reason to devoutly thank Heaven for.

This day has been designated by the President of the United States as a time for the American people to cease from their usual avocations, and to consider and acknowledge, gratefully and reverentially, the many bounties which the year now passing away has brought them, and also the wealth of hope which is stored up for them in the impending future.

Let us, for this while, dismiss from our minds the infelicities and shortcomings of our situation, whatever they may be. Let us remember only how greatly we are blessed in the abundant presence of things without which our condition would be poor and miserable indeed.

THE CUBAN INSURRECTION.—We have Havana papers to the 14th instant, but all that we can glean from them is that the insurrection had not been suppressed. On the 13th troops were sent into the Uuelta.

THE CORONATION OF THE ROSE.—This beautiful cantata, which was sung so well on Tuesday evening by the young ladies of the Second and Third District high schools, is to be reproduced this evening.

THANKSGIVING DAY.—This being the day appointed by President Johnson for thanksgiving and prayer, the government offices throughout the city and State will be closed to all public business.
