RESTRICTIONS ON GRANT.

A new line of prospective division in the Republican party appears in the differing views of some of its politicians on the question of repealing or perpetuating the tenure of office act.

The New York Tribune attempts to disguise its jealousy of Grant under the cloak of solicitude for what it calls the "new principle" enounced in the tenure of office act.

But, no matter upon what theory the continuance in force of the tenure of office act may be urged by leading Radicals, they cannot long conceal from any one that their real object is to hamper Grant with restrictions fully as extreme and rigorous as those which they have imposed upon Johnson.

The fact is, we already see, emerging from the agitation of this question, the outlines of two new conflicting factions of the Republican party; both, in their several ways, revolutionary; the one seeking to aggrandize Congress until the governor shall be made parliamentary, even in a wider and more emphatic sense than that of Great Britain; the other seeking to magnify executive authority until it shall become imperial in grandeur and potency.

CITY FINANCES.

Do the people who oppose the three million ordinance and the tax of one-fourth of one per cent. attached to it, reflect what will be the condition of affairs if that ordinance be defeated at the election to be held on Saturday week?

The city owes at least three million dollars in city notes, payable on demand, and nearly two million more of outstanding warrants, matured interest on the old debt, and in judgments and executions.

If any other means could be adopted to relieve the pressing necessities of the city, why are they not suggested?

Do the people reflect that the city debt must be paid now or hereafter? And that the longer the debt is postponed without a settlement satisfactory to debtor and creditor, the costs and expenses involved in the consequent litigation increase in a frightful ratio, and that it is beyond the power of the council to avert these results?

The current expenses of the city must be met in some way, or the city government must be abandoned and the charter surrendered. Can the property holders, the license payers and the people of New Orleans generally, consent to surrender the charter of the city, and pass the control of municipal affairs into the hands of the appointees of Governor Warmoth?

We beg, therefore, to take issue with the Bee on many of the points brought forward in some of its recent articles in English and French. We would ask our contemporary to take the trouble to ascertain facts and figures from those of the city officers who have the opportunity to furnish it, and we feel convinced that much of its opposition to the ordinance will be abated.

THE FALL MEETING.

The great Fall Meeting over the Metairie Course begins to-morrow. No meeting in the South, since some years before the war, and few in the North or West, have excited so much interest, or brought together so many thoroughbred horses and so many amateurs of legitimate turf sports.

The first race will be a mile and a half dash, for all ages. \$50 entry, play or pay; \$250 added by the club. Each entry to carry 100 pounds. There are seven entries, namely: Bismarck, Tom Green, Chickamauga, the Blackwind colt, Malcolm, a filly by Colossus and Lobelia.

Our readers must not expect a fast, but they will find a good track. The heavy rains of the last few days, and the late overflow, have done a good deal towards temporarily destroying the elasticity of the turf; but, although extraordinary time may not be made, the two races will be gallantly and hardily contested.
