THE FREEDMEN'S ORGAN AND LIBERIAN COLONIZATION.

The Tribune reminds us that we mistated its meaning when we represented it as saying that negro colonists from this State, on going to Liberia, would still be afflicted with carpet-baggery.

THE APPROACHING CRISIS IN EUROPE.
