LOUISIANA ITEMS.

Although the Baton Rouge and Grose Tete Railroad has been in operation for some time, the business increases very fast, scarcely a week passing without bringing down from New Orleans a train of freight cars...

The effect of these continued rains may well be inferred upon the low lands of the parish. No plantation work can be done out of doors, and it will require many days of good weather before it can be even commenced.

First—All slaves are declared as free so soon as their owners present themselves for this purpose to the military chiefs, they, said, peace, reserving to themselves the right, should they desire it, of title to such indemnity as the nation may decree, and with the option of a larger one than that which may be fixed hereafter.

Second—Those freedmen will for the present be utilized in the service of the country in the manner that may be resolved upon.

Fifth—All persons convicted of being enemies of the patria and openly opposed to the revolution shall be confiscated, like any other property, and declared free and without any right of indemnity, while the said slaves will be utilized in the service of the country in the terms already prescribed.

Sixth—In order to determine upon the confiscations referred to in the foregoing article, the respective process will be formed in each case.

Seventh—Those proprietors that facilitate their slaves for the service of the revolution without giving them their liberty at present will preserve their property.

Eighth—The slaves employed in the plantations may be presented to the Cuban authorities shall be declared as free immediately, with the right to live either among us or to continue in the town or the woods, recognizing and obeying the government of the republic.

Cuban Emancipation Proclamation.

The following is the emancipation proclamation of the insurgent government:

Carlos Manuel Cespedes, Captain General of the Eastern District of Cuba, and charged with its provisional government.

The revolution of Cuba, in proclaiming the independence of the Patria, has thereby decreed all the liberties with it; and the great inpropriety of limiting these would scarcely tally or be accepted by the Cuban people.

Therefore, and in virtue of the faculties with which I am vested, I have decided that for the present, and until such time as the military chiefs that operate in the various districts of this department, in order to judge those cases that may present themselves of that nature.
