GENERAL BRECKINRIDGE EXPECTED IN BALTIMORE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—The District Supreme Court today ordered the mandamus from the Supreme Court to be entered under protest, but adopted a rule which effectually excludes Bradley from practice.

In the Supreme Court, before Judge Ingraham, today, the case of Blatchford against Ross, president of the Merchants' Union Express Company, and others, came up on the motion to continue the temporary injunction. The defendants claim that the suit was not instituted in good faith, but in furtherance of a conspiracy.

The House is discussing finance.

Senate.—A petition was presented, asking for the appointment of an official phrenologist to examine heads of applicants.

Senators Chandler, Sumner, Howe, Pomeroy and Edmunds, all presented memorials for woman suffrage.

Henderson introduced a bill allowing half a dozen Indian tribes to become citizens of the United States.

Pomeroy introduced a bill reviving the grant for a railroad from Selma to Gadsden, Ala.

The case of McGeehan vs. the New Idria Quid Miner Mining Company was considered briefly and not ordered.

A motion to take up the central branch of the Union Pacific Railroad failed.

The finance committee bill on the public debt and the currency was resumed. Sherman made a long speech. The bill was postponed.

The central branch of the Union Pacific Railroad was resumed and defeated—23 to 28.

Trumbull reported a bill punishing the illegal acceptance of office with not more than five years imprisonment nor more than \$10,000 fine. Adjourned.

House.—In the contest for precedence of business, the speaker said the matters pressing for action were the bill for the resumption of specie payment, constitutional amendments, and the Georgia election case, business from the reconstruction committee and tariff.

The suffrage bill was resumed and several substitutes offered. Bingham's makes all voters except such as heretofore may engage in rebellion. Shellabarger's substitute allows the disfranchisement of those heretofore engaged in rebellion. No action taken. The House went into committee on the other.

The defeat of the Branch Union Pacific railroad bill involves the loss of two millions subsidy.

Mr. Garratt, president of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad, testified that made little difference whether bridge spans were 300 or 500 feet it erected so as not to obstruct navigation.

The Senate committee on the District of Columbia was addressed by three women this morning, in favor of suffrage in the District. A communication was also read from Mrs. Stanton.

The secretary of the treasury recommends the disposal of the branch mints in North Carolina, Georgia and New Orleans to the best advantage.

House is in session to-night and a general debate in progress.

Gen. Schenck is expected in Baltimore by his family very soon.

FROM NEW YORK.

New York, Jan. 27.—Bishop Littlejohn was consecrated at Long Island today.

Judge Henry Walbridge, of Ithaca, N. Y., aged 80 years, was run over by the cars to-day and killed.

The printers' strike has ended by the shipping merrily, in the higher scale of prices.

The book-printers' strike has ended with an advance of three cents per thousand.

After adjournment of the morning session the majority of the House repaired to the State house and their property destroyed on account of politics, and that the Senate will furnish their protection, was laid on the table.
