WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—(Noon.)—Senate.—Written acceptance of Grant and Colfax was presented.

The bill to allow compensation to office-holders failing to take the oath is pending. A joint resolution was introduced by a resolution removing the political disabilities of all persons in the United States, imposed by the fourteenth amendment to the Constitution. Referred to the reconstruction committee.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—Evening.—House.—Considered under regular call the bill increasing the pay of army officers, equalizing the pay of males and females employed in the executive offices; directing the secretary of the treasury to sell surplus gold, and granting a loan of five millions to the New Orleans and Selma Railroad and Emigration Association.

A joint resolution was passed authorizing the Northern Pacific Railroad, from Lake Superior to Puget Sound, to mortgage the road and telegraph to raise funds for its completion. The evening sessions, after to-morrow, were set apart for the consideration of appropriations. A motion to discharge Scamuel, the recusant witness, failed again—103 to 83.

The House now concurred in the Senate constitutional suffrage amendments. A committee of conference was appointed to report on the bill relieving certain political disabilities, heretofore reported from the reconstruction committee, was taken up. It was stated during the debate that no amendments were made in writing. Without action the House adjourned.

Senate.—Morton introduced a joint resolution requiring parties desiring relief from disabilities to apply in writing for their own names, and that the committee on the subject be authorized to report thereon. The bill paying federal officers in Southern States, who are unable to take the required oath, elicited a long debate. No action taken.

Indian appropriations were resumed till recess. The committee on the bill for the relief of Kentucky in ten days. His health is good. The Supreme Court, in a case involving the validity of gold contracts, decides in effect, that the act making gold and silver legal money has never been repealed; that we have two kinds of legal tender money, gold and silver and paper, and that a contract made for the payment of either is binding and valid, and can be enforced by the courts.

The court decides that the Confederate steamer Georgia, captured while sailing from Liverpool with a cargo of slaves, is a prize of war. Both houses are in session to-night. The Senate is considering the finances, and the House considering the tax bill. Schenck, in a colloquy to-day, expressed the hope of passing the tax bill this session.

Cushing's treaty with the Colombian government comes the following points: The canal to be completed within fifteen years, otherwise the charter falls. The charter to last for a hundred years. The United States to fix the tolls on the canal. The canal to be open to all nations during peace and closed to belligerents during war. Six miles on each side of the canal reserved for the company and half for the Government. Colombia to pay the cost of the canal, and twenty-five per cent. after the cost of the canal is paid. The company is already formed in New York; Peter Cooper, president. United States to locate the canal. Colombia may build it or delegate its powers to the company. The canal to cost \$100,000,000.

The bodies of all the conspirators, but that of Booth, have been delivered to their friends. FROM NEW YORK.

Pioneer Line to Denmark.—Emigrants from Europe. New York, Feb. 15.—The steamer Ariel sails March 14th, for Copenhagen via Southampton, the pioneer line between the United States and Denmark.

FROM MEMPHIS. Railroad Enterprise.—Arrival of a Sister of the Late Maj. Harney. MEMPHIS, Feb. 15.—An engineering party left yesterday to survey the route for the Mississippi river Railroad to Troy. Sufficient stock has already been subscribed to build the road through Shelby and Tipton counties, and as soon as the engineers designate the location work will be commenced.

Mrs. Mason, sister of the late Maj. Harney, who was killed by Arkansas militia, arrived in this city yesterday. She will remove the remains of Maj. Harney to Alexandria, Va., for interment.

FROM ATLANTA. The Georgia Legislature.—Veto. ATLANTA, Feb. 15.—The joint resolution of the Legislature referring the question of the eligibility of negroes to hold office to the Supreme Court of the State, was to-day returned to the Legislature by Gov. Bullock, without his approval. He says the resolution does not settle the question through the Legislature under the law and its subsequent action is excluding a large portion of its members on account of color; that the resolution does not bind the Legislature to abide by the decision of the Supreme Court, and that it indicates a disposition to do so; that the well worded resolves do not touch upon one of the vital points at issue and have no binding force as to others, as not
