Gentlement—Herewith is transmitted an important communication from the chief engineer of the Fire Department and general superturendent of the Water Works, suggesting that a commission be appointed to devise a remedy for the present unsatisfactory arrangements for supplying water for the extinguishing of fires.

Both the chiefengineer and superintendent, as will be seen, suggest a remedy, and are satisfied that "after a full and free conference the difficulties" now in the way of formshing the needful supply of water on the occasion of fires, "can be arranged or removed in a very simple and inexpensive manner." by the establishment of fire disterns and the use of "fire plugs of larger capacity and of a recent and improved pattern."

The communication transmitted is of so much importance to the people at large, and the recommendation therein contained so opportune, that I trust some speedy action will be taken by the Common Council in relation thereto.

Hen, John R. Conway, Mayor of New Orleans:
Sir—The undersigned, chief engineer of the fire department and general superintendent of the Water Works, beg to call your attention and that of the Common Council, to the present very unsatisfactory arrangements for supplying water for the extinguishing of fires, and to suggest some action as a remedy.

The present habit of the fire department is to run the water into the street gatters first and draw it from them into the engines. This necessarily results in some delay before a supply is obtained, and in the meantime property of great value may be lost.

The fire piugs or hydrants of this city, though exceeding in number those of other cities for the same extent of territory, are smaller each in capacity, having been constructed originally for the hand engine.

pacity, having been constructed originally for the hand engine.

In other cities, when the powerful steam engine, requiring a much larger supply of water to each one, was introduced, the old fire plugs were replaced by others of greater capacity. Not so in New Orleans. Henge the habit of first emptying our water into the aircets.

In cities where this matter is well and efficiently regulated they have fire plugs of much larger capacity than ours, and of a recent and improved pattern, and in some places fire cisterns are constructed at intervals where a large supply sufficient for several engines, may be had at at a moment's notice.

We find, too, that the practice only obtains in

We find, too, that the practice only obtains in street scavengers and others the use of keys to the fire plugs, which keeps them constantly out of order and readers it impossible to exercise control over them.

After a full and free conference, we are satisfied all these difficulties can be arranged or removed in a very simple and inexpensive manner. But to bring the matter before you in shape, backed by authority, we respectfully suggest the appointment of a cemmission to examine and report as to the best plan, after they shall have seen experiments with the improved fire plug and clisterss.

experiments with the improved fire plug and cisterns.

We would suggest a member from the committee on fire department and one from committee on water works, of the Common Council, a member of the Board of Commissioners of the Water Works, a member of the Board of Under writers and the president of the Firemen's Chattable Association, with whom the undersigned might be associated for facts, data and practical information, as a commission to whom the matter might be referred, and we feel confident a few hours conference and few experiments will lead to a practical solution of the whole difficulty.

Gentlemen—I have the honor to inform you that according to the amended charter of the New Orleans Gas Light Company, it is their dury to lay down main gas pipes, free of charge, necessary for lighting the leves or river front of the city, whenever required to do so by the Common Council, but in all other localities of the city they are not obligated to lay down their mains under an order without extra compensation.
