Senator Kellogg says the General Longstreet has done great services for the Republican cause in New Orleans.

Elections are soon to be ordered in Cuba for deputies to the Spanish Cortes.

Senators Scott and Cameron opposed Longstreet's confirmation because a British officer wrote that Longstreet had declared that he would have devastated the country.

Foster Blodgett has been appointed postmaster of Augusta, Ga. It is prominently accorded with the fitness of things that the "trooly lol!" Blodgett, who was a Confederate officer during the war, and who was suspended from office because he committed perjury to get the place, should be reinstated by a "trooly lol!" Creswell, who was a violent secessionist in 1861.

The New York World says that there is a statue of Liberty in the capital at Washington so hideous that the very locomotives shriek when they come in sight of it.

One of the newly appointed general officers in New York is a Mr. Wadsworth. He could not understand what claim he had to an appointment till it was discovered that about two years ago he had been spokesman for some gentleman who presented General Grant with Page's picture of General Scott.

GRANT IN THE MIRROR.

No fish was ever more hopelessly immeshed than Grant will be if he continues to submit quietly to the entangling contrivances which the party majorities in both houses of Congress now seem bent on throwing about him.

Well, what is he to do? Will he go against this construction and carry out his view of what the law ought to be? If so, he might as well have disregarded the tenure of office act as it stood in the beginning.

The following is a list of States which have formally ratified the Fifteenth Amendment: Kansas, Feb. 27; Louisiana and Nevada, March 1; Missouri, March 2; West Virginia, March 3; North Carolina, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin, March 5; Maine and South Carolina, March 11; Massachusetts, March 12; Arkansas, March 15; and Pennsylvania, March 25.

The Legislature of Georgia and Delaware on the 18th of March rejected resolutions ratifying the amendment. The Legislature of Rhode Island postponed its consideration until May.

A bill has been introduced in the Pennsylvania Legislature providing that no man in that State shall publish a newspaper until he has proved that "he is honest and of good repute and veracity."

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GRANT AND CONGRESS.

A few days ago the House of Representatives by a decisive vote postponed the Mississippi question until the next session of Congress. General Grant now sends in a message advising that provision be made for holding an election in Virginia, on the Constitution framed for that State by the late carpet-bag convention, and suggesting that the rejected Constitution of Mississippi be again submitted to a popular vote.

Ashley, the impeacher, is to be governor of Montana. This is the man who, when he expected to be chairman of the committee on territories, made a bargain with a friend whose appointment to a territorial position he was to procure, for an interest in town lots and land speculations.
