like manner, the respective ships of war, and post-office or passenger packets, the very countries, shall have liberty, freely and peaceably, to come to all rivers, and places to which other foreign ships and packets are, or may be, permitted to come; to enter into the waters, anchor, and trade, and to be subject always to the laws and usages of the two countries respectively.

**ARTICLE III.**  
The two high contracting parties agree that any favor, exemption, privilege, or immunity conferred, in any manner, upon either of them, which either of them has actually granted, or may hereafter grant, to the citizens or subjects of any other government, nation, or state, shall extend to the citizens of the other contracting party, gratuitously, if the concession in favor of that other government, nation, or state, shall have been gratuitous; or, in return for an equivalent compensation, if the concession shall have been conditional.

**ARTICLE IV.**  
No higher or other duties shall be imposed on the importation of the territories of either of the two contracting parties, of any article of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the territories of the United States, or into, or shall be, payable on the like article of any other or higher duties or charges be imposed in the territories of either of the contracting parties, than such as are, or shall be, payable on the exportation of the like article to any other foreign country; nor shall any other duties or charges be imposed on the importation of any article of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the territories of either of the contracting parties, to or from the territories of the other, than such as are, or shall be, payable on the like article of any other foreign country.

**ARTICLE V.**  
No other or higher duties or charges, on account of tonnage, light or harbor dues, pilotage, or any other local charges, shall be imposed in the ports of the two contracting parties, on the vessels of the other, than such as are, or shall be, payable in the same ports on its own vessels.

**ARTICLE VI.**  
The same duties shall be paid, and the same drawbacks and bounties allowed, upon the importation of any article into or from the territories of the United States, or into or from the territories of the Argentine Confederation, whether such importation or exportation be for the use of the individual citizen, or for the use of the Argentine Confederation, or for the use of the Argentine Confederation.

**ARTICLE VII.**  
The contracting parties agree to consider and treat, as vessels of the United States and the Argentine Confederation, those which are furnished by the competent authority with a regular passport or sea-letter, shall, under the then existing laws and regulations of either of the contracting parties, be treated as national vessels, by that country to which they respectively belong.

**ARTICLE VIII.**  
All merchants, commanders of ships, and other persons, who are engaged in the trade of commerce, in all the territories of the Argentine Confederation, to manage their own affairs themselves, or to commit them to the management of others, shall be subject to the same laws, regulations, and usages, as are, or shall be, applicable to the citizens of the Argentine Confederation. The citizens of the two contracting parties shall reciprocally receive and enjoy full and perfect protection for their persons, property, and shall have free and open access to the courts of justice in the said countries respectively, for the redress of all wrongs, and shall be allowed in all cases, to the buyer and seller, to bargain and fix the price of any goods, wares, or merchandise imported into, or exported from, the Argentine Confederation, and shall be allowed to observe the laws and established customs of the country. The same rights and privileges, in all respects, shall be enjoyed in the territories of the Argentine Confederation, by the citizens of the Argentine Confederation. The citizens of the two contracting parties shall reciprocally receive and enjoy full and perfect protection for their persons, property, and shall have free and open access to the courts of justice in the said countries respectively, for the redress of all wrongs, and shall be allowed in all cases, to the buyer and seller, to bargain and fix the price of any goods, wares, or merchandise imported into, or exported from, the Argentine Confederation, and shall be allowed to observe the laws and established customs of the country.

**ARTICLE IX.**  
In whatever relates to the police of the ports, the loading and unloading of ships, the safety of the merchandise, goods, and effects, and to the securing and disposing of property of every kind, and to the denunciation, either by sale, donation, exchange, testament, or in any other manner, of the property of any individual citizen, or of the citizens of the Argentine Confederation, the citizens of the two contracting parties shall reciprocally receive and enjoy full and perfect protection for their persons, property, and shall have free and open access to the courts of justice in the said countries respectively, for the redress of all wrongs, and shall be allowed in all cases, to the buyer and seller, to bargain and fix the price of any goods, wares, or merchandise imported into, or exported from, the Argentine Confederation, and shall be allowed to observe the laws and established customs of the country.

**ARTICLE X.**  
The citizens of the United States residing in the Argentine Confederation, and the citizens of the Argentine Confederation residing in the United States, shall be exempt from all compulsory military service whatsoever, whether by sea or by land, and from all forestal loans, requisitions, or military exactions; and they shall not be subject to any other taxes, levies, or taxes, greater than those that are paid by native citizens of the contracting parties respectively.

**ARTICLE XI.**  
It shall be free for each of the two contracting parties to appoint consuls, for the protection of trade, to reside in any of the territories of the other party; but before any consul shall act as such, he shall be appointed by the approved and admitted by the government to which he is sent; and either of the contracting parties may, at any time, suspend or terminate such particular places as they judge fit to be accepted.

**ARTICLE XII.**  
The archives and papers of the consulates of the respective governments shall be respected inviolably, and under no pretext whatever shall any magistrate, or any of the local authorities, seize or in any manner interfere with them.

**ARTICLE XIII.**  
The diplomatic agents and consuls of the Argentine Confederation shall enjoy, in the territories of the United States, whatever privileges, exemptions, and immunities are, or shall be, granted to agents of the same government, to the most favored nation; and, in like manner, the diplomatic agents and consuls of the United States shall enjoy, in the territories of the Argentine Confederation, the same privileges, exemptions, and immunities as are, or shall be, granted to agents of the most favored nation.

**ARTICLE XIV.**  
For the better security of commerce between the United States and the Argentine Confederation, it is agreed that, if, in any manner, any interruption of friendly commercial intercourse, or any rupture, should unfortunately take place between the two contracting parties, the citizens of either of them, residing in the territories of the other, shall have the privilege of returning, and continuing their trade or occupation, and of continuing their trade or occupation, so long as they behave peaceably, and commit no offence against the laws; and their persons, property, and effects, shall be treated as those of the citizens of the State in which such citizens may reside.
