WHEAT IN BAD SHAPE.

Farmers in the Western Portion of the State are Discouraged.

Three-fourths of the wheat crop sown in the western third of Kansas this fall is severely injured by the continued drought. In the latter part of September light rains fell which caused the grain to sprout, but in thousands of fields the grain is dead. In the central belt the ground is very dry, and the plants may die if rains do not come soon. Men from that section today say farmers are greatly discouraged by the continued drought.

TROUBLESOME HASKELL.

Again there is a Row Among the Ten Score Voters There.

Joe Rosenthal who was two years ago one of the contestants for a seat in the legislature from Haskell county, is this year acting as attorney for J. G. Michaels of Haskell county who is contesting for the seat to which A. P. Henninger thinks he will get the certificate.

The returns made to the secretary of state show that Michaels, who is an Independent-Republican and was endorsed by the Populists, received ninety-three votes, while A. P. Henninger, the regular Republican nominee, received 108 votes.

The contest is made on the grounds that one of the judges in one of the voting precincts carried the ballot-box home with him when he went to dinner, while there he took out 23 ballots and changed them in favor of Henninger, although they were cast for Michaels.

The contestant claims that the vote should stand, Michaels 102 and Henninger 92. This would give Rosenthal's client the seat in the legislature.

CHAS. CURTIS' EXPENSES.

It Cost Him Nearly \$775 to Run for Congress this Fall.

Congressman Charles Curtis of this district filed his statement of election expenses at the county clerk's office today. The campaign was not a cheap one to him, for his expenses in re-election were \$774.34.

The largest item in the detailed statement was \$400 for printing extracts from his speeches and the Congressional Record and distributing the same. Among the items were: Osage county central committee, \$50; Marion county central committee, \$25; Lyon county central committee, \$25; Greenwood county central committee, \$25; Woodson county central committee, \$25; State central committee, \$25; Republican league, \$10; Clerical help, \$100; Postage and stationery, \$35; Bonds, \$50; North Topeka Banquet club, \$10.

The other items are for railroad fare, hotel expenses, ivory and telegrams. T. P. Rodgers, the successful candidate for county commissioner, spent \$55, of which \$50 went to the County Central committee on two assessments of \$25 each, and \$5 for printing his announcement.

H. G. Larimer, clerk of Topeka township, spent \$33.94, only \$2 of which went towards securing his election. The remainder was given towards fireworks, etc., "as a Republican and a citizen."

FAILURE AFFECTS VEST.

The Senator Interested in a Nebraska Bank Which Closes Its Doors.

OMAHA, Nov. 27.—A special to the Bee from Grand Island, Neb., says: The Security National bank closed its doors at 11 o'clock today. It is held on good authority not to be so much of a failure as a disagreement between the officers of the bank. It has capital stock of \$200,000. The deposits are as low as \$30,000, of which \$20,000 are county funds. United States Senator Vest of Missouri, who is largely interested, has arrived and a directors' meeting is now being held.

A. S. Vest is cashier; H. W. Palmer, county treasurer, is president. It is altogether unlikely that depositors will sustain any loss.

EWING'S CASE CONTINUED.

The North Topeka Rock Welder Will Be Tried Tomorrow.

The case of John Ewing, the North Topeka colored man who pounded Jim Early over the head with a piece of rock Sunday afternoon, came up in police court this morning, and two witnesses were examined before the case was continued till tomorrow.

George Sieber, who drove over the horse at a fire recently, was called for trial, but asked a continuance and it was granted till Thursday morning.

There have been several warrants issued for people who are keeping dogs, but only P. M. Whitlock was present. He was fined \$5.

WANTS TODD'S PLACE.

J. G. Samuelson Would Like to be Labor Commissioner.

J. G. Samuelson of this city is the latest Topeka applicant for an appointment under the incoming state administration. Mr. Samuelson wants to be labor commissioner and he thinks he has a good chance of being made the successor of E. J. J.

Mr. Samuelson expects to have the endorsement of the labor organizations in the state as he has long been identified with the various labor societies. He is now secretary of the State Federation of Labor and expects to have the federation request his appointment. One labor organization has named a committee to request his appointment.

Congressman Curtis has written a letter to Gov. Morrill requesting Samuelson's appointment.

John Calvin was the pope of the reformation from his influence among the reformers. Charles Dibdin, the sea poet, was called the bard of the English navy and the Tyrians of the navy. Thomas Moore was the young Catullus, melodious bard and the Pander of Venus from the character of his words. Jubal A. Early was called the bad old man by the troops of the Confederate army on account of his fighting qualities. Aldiboranti Phosphorino was a nickname given by Walter Scott to his pompous friend, John Ballantyne, the publisher. Moliere was called the anatomist of humanity because of his skill in dissecting human nature and presenting its weaknesses in his plays. Thomas Hobbes, the philosopher, was called the bear on account of his ferocious manner and his habit of swearing on even the smallest provocation. Goethe, among any other nicknames, was the man of many medals in allusion to the decorations and orders bestowed upon him by various kings and princes. Jean Sebastian Bach was called father of modern piano music because his writings were largely for the piano and he was the first to use the thumb in fingering. Samuel Woodworth, the author of the "Old Oaken Bucket" and other poems, was called the American Goldsmith on account of a resemblance in character to the author of the "Deserted Village." Thomas Aquinas, on account of his skill in dialectics and from his personal qualities, was nicknamed Dr. Angelicus, the dumb ox, eagle of divines, father of moral philosophy, the fifth doctor of the church and the second Augustine.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
