\$20,000 CASH.

What Interest on the State Funds Amounts To.

Each year shows a good fat increase in the state's income from its funds under the system of state depository banks. The report of the auditor for the fiscal year which ended June 30 shows that for that year the state received \$19,618 as interest on its funds, an increase of over \$9,000 from the previous year.

This big increase was due partly to the fact that a generally higher rate of interest was paid for the state money, and partly to the fact that the state had more money on hand last year than it had the year T. T. Kelly lost \$550,000 in the Devlin bank failure.

THIS IS THE TALK

Walter Thompson of Thompson Bros., Big Tax Payers, Writes.

To the Editor of the State Journal. Will the city commit a folly?

The people of this state, through their accredited representatives, pass a law for the equitable adjustment of our tax assessment system for the purpose that by means of increased assessment and by reason of honest returns there would be a decrease of taxes and of extravagant municipal and state expenditures.

The people had hopes that that new law would bring them relief from their oppressive tax burden, but how is it? No sooner is the law passed than certain unnecessarily enterprising citizens see an opportunity to accomplish certain municipal retrenchments which they, at few other citizens, wish consummated.

It is always a good business proposition to pay off a debt when you have the money, but the city has no money to pay off its bonds.

One of the objects of this law, as we understand it, is to attract people to our state and city by demonstrating that our taxes are no higher than prevail in sister states and cities.

ANOTHER CLOUD.

Chinese Seize a Japanese Cargo of Arms and Ammunition.

London, Aug. 12.—Another cloud has arisen between China and Japan according to a special dispatch received here from Hong Kong, owing to the seizure at Chinchou by the Chinese authorities of a steamer having on board 10,000 rifles and 2 million cartridges. Japanese merchants have protested saying that this cargo belongs to them and they treat to make another international question out of the matter.

SON OF A RABBI.

SIX FOUND ALIVE.

Miners Had Been Entombed for Five Days.

Mexico City, Aug. 12.—Six of the 18 miners who were entombed in the Ianta Gertrubis mine near Pauchli, were rescued alive early this morning. They were imprisoned five days ago, as the result of a cave-in. Twelve of them are still below ground and tapings on a pipe indicate that some of them are yet alive.

Rescuing parties are working in short shifts boring through a wall of solid rock.
