A PASTOR ARRESTED.

Charge of Bigamy Brought Against the Rev. F. E. Thomas at Larned.

Larned, Kan., Oct. 22.—The Rev. F. E. Thomas, a Baptist evangelist, was arrested here yesterday on a charge of bigamy brought by Rev. F. W. Gokin, pastor of the Baptist church. Thomas came from Tecumseh, Neb., where he had a wife and child. He declared he obtained a divorce in Colorado Springs, later after which he married a widow in Great Bend, Kan. He waived preliminary hearing.

AN ISLAND PRISONER.

A. J. McAdams and His Horse Spent a Night in the Arkansas.

Great Bend, Kan., Oct. 23.—Marooned on an island in the Arkansas river twenty-four hours was the experience of A. J. McAdams this week. Wednesday morning McAdams, who lives on the north bank of the Arkansas river, went to "The Big Island" in the river, about half a mile below the Main street bridge in this city. He tried to leave but the current was so swift that he couldn't, so was compelled to stay on the island all night. Several attempts were made to get him off by boat but without success. His rescuers decided to await the receding of the flood. Another big raise reached here Thursday morning and flooded the island. A boat was launched near the bridge later and McAdams was rescued. The horse which he drove to the island was left there.

KERN'S LITTLE SON IS BETTER.

There is a Slight Chance for His Ultimate Recovery.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 23.—John W. Kern, Jr., son of the Democratic vice presidential candidate, who is suffering from nerve paralysis and acute indigestion, was still in a critical condition early today. It was feared for a time last night that he would not live until morning. Today it was said there is a slight chance for the child's ultimate recovery.

THERE TO HEAR HEART.

Much Disappointment in Toledo at the Editor's Nonappearance.

Toledo, O., Oct. 23.—Thomas L. Higen, Independence party candidate for president, told of his struggles with the Standard Oil company before a great crowd in Memorial hall last night. Higen's charges were veiled at times, but by inference he accused the Standard Oil company of almost every crime known.

William Randolph Hearst was scheduled to speak, but returned to New York. When ex-representative Howard of Alabama told of Mr. Hearst's unexpected call to the east and requested those who did not care to stay to quit the hall, there was a rush for the doors. He succeeded in recalling them, however, and spoke at length.

Mr. Higen told of the methods of the oil company in winning and dining agents of his company to learn secrets. He said the Standard had given away oil in Springfield, Ill., to drive him out of business.

TO ATTACH ENTIRE ROAD.

Frantic Efforts of an Official to Collect an \$18,000 Judgment.

New York, Oct. 23.—In an effort to collect a judgment for \$18,000 against the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad, Deputy Sheriff Burns yesterday attempted to attach the entire railroad. The deputy went to the offices of the railroad and served the attachment on Treasurer Thomas F. Paradise, announcing that he intended to levy on the office furniture. On being told that the furniture would not cover the amount, he stated that he would then levy on the railroad. He left the treasurer's office with the intention of attaching one of the trains standing ready to leave the station. While officials were explaining to him that the rolling stock of the road was all mortgaged and therefore could not be attached, the road's attorneys secured a stay of execution from the supreme court. The judgment represents a ruling of \$17,500 and costs obtained by William Carroll, whose legs were cut off while he was repairing a car in the company's yards.
