


SIR THOMAS LIPTON'S LATEST CRAZE.

EDITOR SHOT MAN.

F. W. Duvall, of Norton Courier, Fires at William Thields.

Result of Argument Over the Telephone Controversy.

WOUND NOT SERIOUS.

Some Letters Reflecting Upon Mrs. Thields the Cause.

Some Lively Encounters Are Expected in This Feud.

Norton, Kan., March 3.—What bids fair to develop into a feud at this place is the culmination of the telephone troubles which have been aired in the county papers for the past three months.

A few days ago some letters regarding Mrs. Thields, who is the head bookkeeper of the company, were printed in the Courier and the letters implied that Mrs. Thields was a woman of questionable character. Thields had called upon Duvall to remonstrate with him over the publication of the letter. The argument grew exceedingly warm and when Thields started to leave Duvall pulled a revolver from his pocket and shot at Thields.

Thields was not seriously hurt. The bullet struck him on the left side of the breast, but for some reason did not penetrate and no serious injury resulted. At first he was thought to have been mortally wounded but he was suffering great pain, but soon recovered after being taken to the office of a local physician.

The telephone controversy is growing virulent in this section of the state. It started several months ago, and the directors and officials are divided among themselves, and both sides seem to be endeavoring to get the other side out of the company. Charges of fraud and other means are indulged in by both sides.

According to the statement of C. F. Foley, one of the directors, Thields was sent to see Duvall on some company business after which the argument which ended in the firing took place. As a result of the shooting, the different factions are at greater odds than ever, and excitement here is intense.
