HUGHES ON THE WATCH.

Governor Sends Representatives to Sheephead Bay.

New York, Sept. 7.—Published reports that race track gambling had openly revived caused Governor Hughes to send four special representatives to the J. Sheepshead Bay track where there are observing conditions.

Complaint was made to the governor that the recent anti-betting law was being flagrantly violated, that bookmakers were accepting wagers from all persons and that records were being kept. The governor's representatives, who will be at the track several days, are said to have seen a very serious violation.

The bookmakers had been warned before hand that the governor's special agents would be at the track and there was any betting it was no apparent to the casual observer. But this action of the governor indicates that he proposes to keep a close watch on race tracks.

PLAN A DRAINAGE DISTRICT.

New Channel Will Shorten Cottonwood River 15 Miles.

Emporia, Kan., Sept. 7.—The land owners in the Cottonwood and Neesho river valleys in Lyon county, have organized with a view to improving the channels of the cottonwood stream so as to prevent overflows during the flood season.

At a meeting held here a committee was appointed to circulate petitions for the purpose of extending the drainage district to extend from Hartford on the east to Emporia on the west.

The plan is to make a new channel from the Cottonwood to the Neesho below its junction with the Cottonwood. The cut would be three miles long whereas the present course of the river goes eighteen miles.
