Two Days' Registration for City Primaries Is 218.

Books Will Be Removed to City Building Tomorrow.

LARGEST WAS 2,795.

In First Ward When Bergundthal Ran for Mayor.

Other Items of Interest in the First Ward.

What will the registration be? The record for Tuesday and Wednesday for the First ward is 218. These two days the books have been open from noon until 8 p. m. at 1009 Kansas avenue.

Then the books will be taken to the office of the commissioner of elections at the city building where they will be open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. until March 8.

The largest registration in the First ward was 2,795 in 1903 when W. S. Bergundthal ran for mayor.

However, indications are that almost as large a poll will be registered for the city primary which takes place March 23.

When the books closed Tuesday afternoon only 49 had registered. The close Wednesday afternoon showed a registration of over three times that number or 149. It is probable that more than that many will register this afternoon.

Those who do not may do so at the city building within the dates mentioned.
