

DENY HIM JUSTICE

Schenck Says City Court Treatment Unfairly.

Removes Eaton Assault Case to District Court.

IS PLAYING POLITICS.

County Attorney Itimates Garver Is Out For Office.

Acting Judge Denies all Motions of Prosecution.

Because Robert Garver, judge pro tem of the city court, declined to continue the assault case against Chief of Police Eaton, and also declined to dismiss the case without prejudice, County Attorney J. H. Schenck today filed a complaint in the district court charging R. W. Eaton with assault upon C. A. Sloan, the reporter who is alleged to have been struck and kicked by the chief of police.

Because the police department of the city is being criticized during a political campaign Judge Garver refused to dismiss the assault charge against Chief of Police Eaton. He also refused to continue the case until March 23.

Mr. Schenck stated that it would be impossible for him to try the case until March 23 as he would be busy until that time in the district court.

Case a Mixup. There is a pretty mix in the Eaton case in the city court. Judge Garver, a candidate for judge of the court of Topeka, has been appointed judge pro tem by Judge Simon. Simon is a candidate for county attorney to succeed Mr. Schenck.

There is no doubt that the county attorney's force feared to try the Eaton case before for judge of the court of today's events. The attorneys claim to have been unfairly treated.

The reason for the dismissing of the case in the city court and bringing of another action in the district court is said to have been the belief of Mr. Schenck that he was not getting a fair deal in the Eaton case.
