#### Want Large Crowd at Civic Club Meeting.

#### Aviation Meet Will Be Thoroughly Discussed.

#### STREET DECORATION

#### May Be Among Matters Threshed Out Tonight.

#### Will Meet Again at Lukens' Opera House.

Wanted: Large crowd at mass meeting at Lukens' opera house tonight. This is the expressed desire of all of the officials of the Civic club and those interested in the aviation meet which is to be held at the Taylor tract north of Garfield park in June. The matter mentioned will be taken up and thoroughly discussed, and the part that the Civic club is to take in the proposition will be learned. Then its work will be assigned to different committees.

Among other committees to have important work will probably be one on civic pride. As suggested in the State Journal Thursday, it is likely that this committee will be asked to look after the cleaning up of the streets for the occasion. Under their supervision it is probable that requests will be issued asking that the yards and premises, especially those toward Garfield park, be cleaned up, the tin cans and other trash removed from the yards and the alleys be made reasonably neat. The use of paint where needed will of course be encouraged.

Another matter which may be discussed will be decorating the streets. For all of these things mentioned and for other reasons, the club officials are very anxious that as large an attendance as possible be present tonight. Every one will be welcome whether club members or not. C. W. Lukens as hitherto, has donated the use of his opera house without expense to the club.
