### DOLLEY COMES BACK.

Outwites J. D. Kramer in Letter Writing Contest.

State Bank Commissioner Dolley in answering the Wagstaffian statement of J. D. Kramer yesterday says it reminds him of a drowning man grasping for a straw. The commissioner takes up the penitentiary, banking department, and primary law issues in the following reply: Mr. J. D. Kramer, Secretary, Wagstaff Campaign Committee, Topeka.

I note your statement of June 23rd and I take pleasure in reply. What you have to say only emphasizes to the people of Kansas your already unenviable reputation for making statements that are misleading and untrue.

You refer, first, to the four extra bank examiners under the guaranty law and charge that I continued them on the pay roll after the law became involved in the courts. You know when you made this statement, Mr. Kramer, that it was false. The facts are, as you could readily have ascertained if you were seeking the truth, that a few days after the friends of Mr. Wagstaff and Senator Curtis succeeded in getting an injunction against the people's guaranty law, that I removed three of the deputy bank examiners. This is the first instance of your wilful ignorance or malicious falsehood.

As to your second charge, you know as every other man knows who has taken the trouble to inform himself, that there is no comparison between the penitentiary under the management of Warden Coddling and the same penitentiary under the management of Warden Haskell. You know that the penitentiary has been raised from the lowest level of penitentiaries in this country to the highest standard of excellence along the lines of humanity and business methods.

You state that there are three employees at the penitentiary from Maple Hill. You are wrong again; there are but two, and I am glad indeed, that you mentioned them as they are not employees in the service of the state. These two men were employed by Warden Haskell, and one of them, Mr. Lindsay, is now deputy warden of one of the best deputy wardens the state has ever employed. Warden Haskell told me that Mr. Lindsay was the best officer he had in the institution and that Mr. Gilbert, the other party from Maple Hill, was also a good officer. E. N. Barlow was employed by Warden Coddling and does not come from Maple Hill but comes from Harveyville. These men are all big, strong, young, robust officers and a credit to any institution of this kind. They are not old, broken down, worn-out politicians that were removed from the community where they resided because they were a charge upon the public as many of the guards supplied by Mr. Wagstaff's friends were at the penitentiary. Coddling took charge of the penitentiary. As before stated, it gives me real pleasure to have you call attention to such able and efficient employees as the above named.

In regard to the third item; there is no comparison between this department under my administration and under that of Mr. Royce, as is well known by all who are interested. The department is doing more than double the volume of business it did under Mr. Royce's administration, and is doing so, credit and advisory departments in regard to stock investments and all other business matters that are of interest to the people of Kansas.

You seem to be unaware that the Kansas banking department has opened its doors to serve the depositors and all of the people of Kansas in a business way and is not used as a political machine to bring meat into camp as it has heretofore been constituted.

And now with reference to the \$150 per month to which you refer: This money comes out of my contingent fund and is used to pay postage and all the incidental expenses of this department, including the compensation of my assistants, and the very large amount of account of the large volume of increased business. The fund is under the care of Miss Anna Speck, one of my assistants who has been connected with the department for the past eight years. She keeps a complete record of the account and takes receipts for every item, all of which is kept under my supervision, with the consent and approval of the state auditor, and is subject to investigation by anyone who cares to make an examination. My contingent fund was being paid with this \$150 per month, and if the needs of the department demand an expenditure of twice that sum I do not hesitate to meet the emergency.

Do you not know that it is a fact that the standard of the state banks as to solvency has been raised very markedly during the past year? It may be news to you but it is nevertheless true that when I took charge of this department, more than a dozen banks were insolvent and in a falling condition and some of them had been insolvent for more than three years and their capital stock depleted several times over. These banks today are all good sound, solvent substantial institutions and several hundred thousand dollars of the Kansas depositors' money has been removed from a very dangerous position to one of absolute safety.

Probably you are not aware that the Kansas statutes provide that this department shall examine and supervise building and loan associations and that these laws make it mandatory that this be done, and further that my predecessors have ignored these laws. Millions of dollars of the people of Kansas are deposited in these institutions and this department has not heretofore known their true condition. During the past year we have made an exhaustive research of the different savings and building and loan departments of the United States, gathering information from all sources, and we have also had the matter up with expert accountants and have mapped out plans to examine the Kansas institutions closely. In fact, expert accountants have already begun this work. We are thus obeying the law and will soon be in a position to advise the investors, something that has never been attempted in the past.

I have no excuse to offer for the administration of the Kansas banking department, but am rather proud of the work that has been done. Its administration stands solely upon its work and the results shown.

Do you know that the unjust and untrue howl as to the increase of taxes promulgated by the friends of Senator Curtis and being preached by Mr. Wagstaff, has done and is doing more to injure the business interests of Kansas and defeat the fair name of our state, than any other political assault made in recent years? Many of the state, come to my desk certifying this statement. Incidentally, I would like to ask you, Mr. Kramer, how much this increase of taxes that you claim, has increased the personal taxes of yourself and Mr. Wagstaff in dollars and cents? You have had considerable experience in the management of political campaigns and as a friend, I advise you that you are pursuing wrong methods. If you expect to gain the confidence of the Kansas peo-

### NORTON OPENS FIRE.

Says Betts Forces Tried to Buy Him Off.

The fight for the nomination for sheriff on the Republican ticket has been livened up by the open letter from Col. Jonathan D. Norton, which is appended. It was issued this morning and is self-explanatory.

Predictions have been made that the campaign for the Republican nomination for this office will be the hottest fight of the entire election and Colonel Norton's letter, as the opening gun, seems to justify the prophecy. It is as follows:

Topeka, Kan., June 24, 1910.

"To the Voters of Shawnee County: 'Gentlemen: I am the law and order candidate for sheriff, as you are aware, I am entitled to the nomination by all rules of civil service and precedent. I have served two and one-half years as under sheriff and but one year as sheriff.

"I am the only candidate who has had any experience in the duties of the office. I feel that I am entitled to a second term.

"I have been told recently by emissaries from Mr. Betts that I will be defeated, that they will put enough money and 'mud slinging' into the campaign to accomplish this. I am going to force my retirement, then they proceeded to try to bribe me, offering me a cash refund of all my campaign expenses, also the position of under sheriff, with a good salary, or any other position equally as good, to withdraw from the race.

"This proposition was made me this week by Mr. Metzger, president of the German-American State bank, who is the manager of Mr. Betts' campaign; also, by Mr. Frank Stahl, Mr. Harry Larimer and others whom I will name if necessary. I, of course, refused all propositions and filed my nomination papers.

"Those gentlemen also informed me that they had secured the influence of the Daily Capital for Mr. Betts and that they expected to get the State Journal; also, that they had an unlimited amount of money to put into this campaign and were confident of winning.

"Why does Mr. Betts, vice president of the German-American State bank, want the office of sheriff?

"Why does Mr. Metzger, president of the German-American State bank, want to be the political 'boss' of Shawnee county?

"As members of the 'liberal' drinking clubs of Topeka, why are they determined to get me off the track and out of their way? Is it because I am a life long temperance Republican?

"My friends, don't believe their campaign fabrications but ascertain the truth. Every official act of mine is open to investigation, the books of the sheriff are public records. Come and see for yourself. Sincerely yours,
