How and Where Butter Is Made. So much for the milk. But don't forget the butter factory.

Keep in mind these words and the butter provided elusive and obstinate in the old fashioned churn.

Then again—All about that well on the farm, in the house behind the stove, few germs and bacteria of various diseases and disorders which came in contact with the cream as well as the lactic acid culture.

Today there are grandmothers and even mothers, still carefully bundling blankets about balky cream to keep it warm, to develop the lactic acid culture, to make the cream sour in order to churn the butter from it.
