

SNAP SHOTS

The balloon will be used as a captive balloon at the fair, and will be let up by a rope and winch to a height of from 1,000 to 1,500 feet. Passengers may ride in it thus and have an opportunity of seeing Topeka and surrounding country from that height. The balloon will be hauled down after the party in the air. It will be in charge of the officials of the Western Aero club of Topeka, the owners of the gas bag.

HAS DEAD MAN'S LEG.

Woman on Whom Bone Grafting Is Tried Will Recover.

New York, July 14.—By grafting the shin bone of a man onto a woman suffering from necrosis, thus practically giving her a whole new lower leg, the surgeons of the New York Hospital for Deformities have completed an operation unique in surgery. Up to now operations of this sort have been confined to experimental work done on dogs.

The first essential was to get a good healthy bone to take the place of the one eaten by disease. After a time one of the hospitals which handle emergency cases reported that a man had been killed in an accident. As the body was unclaimed and would have gone either to the potter's field or the dissecting table of some medical college, requisition was made for one of the legs, from which the tibia was taken. It was kept in an ice box, immersed in strong salt solution until the surgeons were ready to use it.

Danbury, Conn., July 14.—A family of robins have built their nest on a trolley wire at Reynolds Bridge here. The nest is cleverly mounted around the heavily charged wire so that the trolley pole of passing cars will not interfere with the birds' housekeeping. The bird family remains in their place when a car goes by, apparently enjoying the oscillation of their wavering nest.





NEW GARDEN IS PLANNED.

New Arena Will Be Built Over Grand Central Station.

Albany, N. Y., July 14.—The demolition of Madison Square Garden, which is to be replaced by an office building, will not deprive New York for long of a great indoor amusement hall and arena, according to the plans of an expedition company just incorporated. A new arena will be built over the New York Central railroad tracks above the Grand Central station, to cost between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000 and to provide a suitable place for holding exhibitions, athletic contests, bicycle races and political conventions. The arena will be 285 by 125 feet and will be completed in January.


