Topeka Firemen Indignant Over Charges That No Campaign for Fire Protection.

GENERAL ORDER NO. 100

Issued Not Long Ago Divided City Into Prevention Districts. Fire Loss Decreases in Topeka—Increases Elsewhere.

Chief Wilmarth and Mayor Billard are much exercised over an erroneous article appearing in the morning paper Sunday August 25. The story stated that fire protection was best secured through fire prevention.

"We believe essentially in prevention through protection," declared the fire marshal, hotly. "Inspection has been going on for 15 years, and increasing each year as the city grew. It is an absolute fact that the fire loss in the States have been constantly increasing, while in Topeka they have been decreasing for the past few years."




