

KAWS LOST BOTH

Suffered With Fielding and Batting Slump.

Nick Maddox Pitched First Game in Western League.

Wichita, Kan., June 16.—Wichita won both games of the double header from Topeka by scores of 12 to 2 and 7 to 1. The Kawes were in a fielding and batting slump and did not come close to playing their real game. Both Rustenhaven and Taylor were ineffective in the first game. Rope Perry pitched his first game since he sprained his ankle about six weeks ago and he was in no danger at any stage.

Cochran attempted to bunt to open the first game but popped to Perry. Forsthe doubled but Lee and Gear popped to short and first. Smith fanned in the third but Taylor, who replaced Rustenhaven in the second inning, singled to left. Cochran singled. Forsthe flew to Middleton. Lee walked, filling the bases and Gear got a free tick, forcing in a run. Rapps forced Gear at second.

With one down in the seventh Forsthe drew a base on balls. Lee doubled, putting runners on second and third. Gear scored. Forsthe on his sacrifice fly to right. Rapps flew to Middleton.

A rally was started in the ninth. Taylor was out at first. Cochran and Forsthe singled. Lee was robbed of a hit when Pettigrew picked up his Texas Leaguer and forced Cochran at third. Gear flew to Middleton.
