The Gem.

Detective Feature at Crystal.

It shows some of the big battleships at target practice, gives scenes in the barracks, glimpses of the great tour around the world and other things of general interest.

North Side Fireman Saved Valuable Goods for M. Lewis.

A robbery occurred Friday night about midnight at the confectionery and second-hand store at 915 North Kansas avenue. The store is operated by Max Lewis. The thief broke the glass in the front window of the store and succeeded in making his escape with three revolvers.

The robbery was witnessed by D. Alden, a fireman of fire station No. 1. Alden ran to the store from the firemen's quarters and frightened the thief away from the window. There were a number of things lying in the window that were of more value than the revolvers which were taken and had not the thief been interrupted in his work by Alden he would have undoubtedly made his get-away with a large amount of loot.

The affair has been reported to the police. Alden was able to give a fairly good description of the man but up to the present time no arrest has been made in connection with the theft.

Before the work of tearing down the old building was commenced the firemen dug up the vine and placed it where it would be safe.
