NEGROES FOR HODGES SEATON'S ONLY SPEECH

Quindaro University Trustee Tells of Colored Support.

Because of his attitude toward the colored men and women of the state, Governor Hodges will this year receive the largest number of negro votes ever cast for the Democratic gubernatorial candidate in Kansas, according to A. D. Griffin, a trustee of Western university at Quindaro. Griffin bases his claim on a personal trip through the Second, Fourth, Seventh and Eighth congressional districts.

"There is a surprisingly strong sentiment among the colored voters for Governor Hodges," said Griffin, "and I am confident he will receive by far the largest negro vote ever cast for a Democratic candidate for governor in Kansas. His strength among the colored voters is due to his recognition of the race in his appointments of several negro girls as nurses at the state hospitals and his opposition to Jim Crow legislation in the state. Among the younger and better educated class of negroes, say from 21 to 40 years, there is a surprising strength for the governor and the old cry that the Kansas negroes voted a straight Republican ticket, will not hold true in the campaign this year."

Griffin was appointed by Governor Hodges in 1913 as a trustee of Western university, the big colored school at Quindaro.

Pardon Clerk Will Make Campaign Talk at Emporia.

Sam Seaton, head of the Hodges press bureau, will defend the record of the Democratic state administration in a speech in Emporia Saturday night. The Emporia talk will be Seaton's first, last and only speech in the campaign.


It has been repeatedly claimed that Seaton has secured the actual publication of more material than any publicity man who held a job in the state house—and the records would probably show the statement correct. But Seaton has not taken to the stump. He has received several invitations to speak during the campaign, but has declined by his publicity job.

The other day, however, Seaton was asked to close the Democratic campaign in William Allen White's hometown. He has accepted the invitation and will speak Saturday night at the wigwam in Emporia.

Work of Topeka Commercial Club Was Praised.

Enthusiastic Membership Meeting Monday Night.

SMOKER FOR THE KNOCKERS

Complaints Will Be Heard on Another Occasion.

Awarding of Campaign Prizes Feature of Meeting.

That the Topeka Commercial club is an essential element in the development of Topeka and that the organization could be an even greater factor for good were more Topeka citizens shouldering their portion of the responsibility in carrying out the work, was the sentiment at a "got acquainted" smoker held at the club quarters Monday night. There were 150 men present at the meeting—old and new members. It was a "happy" affair. Aside from several good entertainment features which lent variety to the meeting some rousing talks were given by new and old members.

First of a Series. Suggestions were made looking towards the betterment of Topeka. I. Will Kelley, secretary, announced that the smoker was the first of a series of monthly meetings. He stated that one of these meetings will be given over entirely to the "knockers." "It will give us a chance to see ourselves as others see us," said Secretary Kelley. Henry Bennett presided at the meeting.

Entertainment Features. E. F. Maxwell, manager of the Novelty theater, brought the De Grey Four quartet from that popular play house. This musical combination was given the applause they deserved. They were amusing to say the least—and they could sing. Fred Ullman, a comparatively recent addition to the club membership, gave a clever impersonation of a woman. He rendered a soprano solo in approved style.

In the fore part of the evening many persons were initiated into the mysteries of the Self Starting club. An initiation fee of 10 cents was charged. Richard Wilson collected a large number of these fees with the stipulation that each member from whom the collection was taken should be initiated at a later date. The money collected in this manner—six dollars—was turned over to the Red Cross fund today. The prize awarded to the membership campaign team consisting of W. W. Webb, Ed A. Tirrell and Robert Stone, was also turned over to the Red Cross fund.

Prizes Were Awarded. One of the features of the meeting was the awarding of prizes to the campaign teams as a token of appreciation for their work. The winning team in the largest number of members consisting of George Godfrey Moore, H. H. Pugh and Fred Coulson, was given a handsome silver loving cup offered by the long view club, the membership of which is confined to commercial club men, who have as an object the restoration of the lost art of conversation.

The other prizes were offered by Topeka merchants and other business men. As a booby prize the committee under George McDermott received a huge tag doll. The following committee chairmen received prizes in the order named: George Godfrey Moore, W. W. Webb, C. H. Matthews, Dr. E. S. Pettyjohn, S. E. Spalding, E. L. Overton, Richard Wilson, G. R. Harries, C. E. Bascom, S. E. Cobb, E. F. Maxwell, W. J. Rickenbacher, Harry D. Wright, A. D. Busch, C. E. Eldridge, W. H. Davis, S. Elliott, Harry Snyder and George McDermott.

Dr. E. S. Pettyjohn and Frank Curry composed the committee on awards. W. H. Davis, who aside from C. S. Elliott, was the only one of the sixteen original members of the Topeka Commercial club present at the meeting, made an interesting bit of history. "It was some struggle I tell you," said Mr. Davis. "We had a little room over across the street."

J. Will Kelley spoke of the objects of the Commercial club. "I believe the man who joins this organization with the view that he will reap immediate personal benefits in doing so, is under misapprehension," said Secretary Kelley. "Membership in the Commercial club requires sacrifice. A member must give up time and some of his pocket money so that the club may go ahead. This must be a concrete organization that will be a factor for good."

Will Do His Part. Dr. O. L. Cook, new pastor of the First Christian church who lived in Topeka fourteen years ago, said: "I'd be ashamed of myself if I did not intend to help in building up Topeka as a beautiful city in which to live. It is the best retail city in the western country. It is more safe for out-of-town shoppers, and the stores are excellent. Let's get the advantages excel those of Kansas City."

George Godfrey Moore: "In the past we have had an organization we had to crank; now we want self-starters." Mr. Moore extended those present an invitation to join the Self Starting club. Through the suggestion of R. D. Blaine, J. Will Kelley, secretary, recommended that the committee on immigration will be re-established and that Mr. Blaine will undoubtedly be made chairman. In former years this committee under Mr. Blaine did effective work in inducing persons to come to Topeka from England and elsewhere.

After a very brief time in deliberation the jury gave a decision for Goodwin.

On account of track repairs being made by the Topeka Street Railway company on Kansas avenue, north-bound Kansas avenue cars are being detoured over Quincy street. An enterprising Quincy street business man is advertising that the cars are carrying passengers by his place free of charge so they may have a view of his new building.

Within a short time the board of county commissioners will make official designation of what are to be the new county roads for maintenance purposes. A number of miles of roads are to be taken over by the county as soon as the townships where they are situated have completed certain permanent improvements necessary before their delivery.

ANTHONY IN TOPEKA.

Congressman Spoke to Two Good Political Meetings.

Congressman D. R. Anthony, Jr., opened a two days' speaking campaign in Shawnee county Monday night when he addressed two political meetings in Topeka. With Miss Dottie Curtis, Congressman Anthony spoke in Kneiser's hall at First and Jefferson street and in the Odd Fellows' hall in Oakland.

Anthony's speeches in Shawnee county are in defense of his record in Washington. He declares that the alleged records used by political opponents to bring about his defeat in the present campaign have been garbled and have tended to mislead the voters concerning his official action. Anthony denied that he voted against the direct election of United States senators when the bill came up for final passage. Following his defense of his official record, Anthony flayed the Democrats for their record and declared that their program was not constructive, but destructive, and that legislation in the interests of the people could be secured only through the program offered by the Republican party.

Miss Dottie Curtis, who accompanied Congressman Anthony on his speaking tour in Shawnee county, pleaded for the election of the entire Republican ticket. A number of county candidates attended the Anthony-Curtis meetings.
