BANK VAULT HIS TOMB

Frank James's Ashes to Repose in St. Louis.

Kansas City, Feb. 19.—The body of Frank James, the former outlaw, who yesterday died at his home near Excelsior Springs, will be cremated in St. Louis and the ashes kept in a local safety deposit vault, relatives here announced today. This was one of his last wishes, it was said. Also, at his own request, there will be no religious service at the funeral, to be held on his farm tomorrow. John F. Phillips, former federal judge here, who defended James when he was tried for murder and acquitted in Gallatin, Mo., will deliver the funeral address.

Several years ago at the funeral of General Joe O. Shelby, under whom Frank James served in the Confederate ranks, and whose funeral address Judge Phillips delivered, the judge promised the former bandit to officiate at his funeral.

Frank James did not explain why he preferred to have his ashes kept in a safety box, instead of in the cemetery at Kearney, Mo., beside the bodies of his mother and his brother Jesse, but relatives asserted he wished to avoid the constant procession of morbid persons who visit the grave of Jesse James. Jesse James's body was buried in the dooryard of the old homestead near Excelsior Springs until thirteen years ago, when it was removed to the cemetery at Kearney. Thousands of persons have visited the grave every year.

SECRETARY FOR GIRLS

There Is Need of Another Secretarial Position at Y. W. C. A.

Two subscriptions of \$15 a month or \$180 a year have encouraged the officials of the Y. W. C. A. in their undertaking to raise money to pay the salary of a special secretary to handle the work among the girls.

Three more subscriptions of this size would be sufficient to assure the secretaryship, but subscriptions of any size would be appreciated. There is need of a competent secretary to do personal work among the girls.

"All sizes of gifts are acceptable," said one of the secretaries, "from large ones to the widow's mite. Money is wanted for those phases of the association work that are not self-sustaining; the organization is 77 per cent self-sustaining. Money is now wanted for the remaining 23 per cent."

THEY STEAL A SAFE.

Robbers Roll It Out of Car on a Moving Train.

Washington, Feb. 19.—Police and deputy sheriffs were scouring the Virginia hills today for two masked robbers who raided the express car of the Seaboard Air Line's Florida flyer just after it passed Alexandria, Va., last night but found an empty safe.

The men boarded the express car as the train stopped at Alexandria station almost within sight of the Washington monument and bound and gagged the messenger. They rolled the safe, which was empty, out the car door as the train was slowing to a halt and then jumped off. The holdup was not discovered until the train reached Richmond, three hours later.

FIGHT IN THE STREETS

Striking Tailors Battle With Men Trying to Take Their Jobs.

New York, Feb. 19.—Sixteen men were arrested today in a riot in Fifth avenue, almost directly in front of St. Patrick's cathedral. For a quarter of an hour traffic was halted for several blocks while 200 men fought in the street.

Police reserves charged the crowd with night sticks and after a hard battle dispersed the rioters. The police asserted the fight was between strikers from a nearby tailoring establishment and men who sought to take their places.

TO FORGET GEORGE?

Topeka City Schools Will Not Be Dismissed on Washington's Birthday.

Teachers of the city schools received official notice from the public school office through a bulletin that the schools will not be dismissed for even a day on Washington's birthday—next Monday.

Because the event has fallen on Saturday and Sunday in the last two years the schools were not dismissed but it was formerly the custom to dismiss them.

One teacher called the State Journal this afternoon fifteen minutes after she had seen the bulletin and said: "I think it is an outrage—I certainly think so, and there are others who feel the same way." When asked for her name this school teacher said she did not dare to give it for fear she would have her "head taken off."

John Kemp, 80 years old and one of the oldest settlers in Kansas, died at 3 o'clock this morning at his home, six miles north of Topeka. He came here in 1859 and had lived in Shawnee county continuously since that date. Mr. Kemp lived on the farm where he died for the past forty-two years and had many friends in the county. He is survived by his wife. The remains will be taken from the home Sunday afternoon at 1 o'clock. Funeral services from Eimon's church at 3 o'clock Sunday. Burial in Halfway cemetery.

Edward Blake Burnett, 79, died today at his home, 213 West 21st street. The funeral will be held at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon from Penwell's chapel. Interment in Topeka cemetery.

Alexander A. Gilbert, 78 years old, died at 3 o'clock this morning at his home, one-half mile west of the Country club. The body will be taken to Rock Creek, Kan., for burial.
