PASS PRICE BILL

Senate Approves Measure Bearing on Penitentiary Case.

Convicted Felons May Testify as Witnesses in Court.

FAVORED SIX BILLS TODAY

Upper House Passed Measures, Mostly of Local Interest.

Appropriation for State School at Lansing Prison.

The senate this morning passed the price bill removing from convicted felons the disability to testify as a witness which has hitherto been imposed upon them by Kansas law. The bill provides for the removal from the penitentiary to court room of any prisoner whose testimony is required in the hearing of a case, or deposition of prisoners may be taken within the prison walls at the request of a defendant.

It is understood that if this bill passes the house of representatives it will be immediately called into use to permit the taking of testimony in a case at the Kansas penitentiary where convict testimony is the only evidence that can be produced in the investigation of the murder of a prisoner which occurred a few months ago.

The senate also passed the Davis bill for the regulation of pool and billiard halls which would permit such an institution to be closed as a nuisance upon persistent complaints of mismanagement. Other bills passed today were:

House bill 102 by Mr. Doerr, authorizing cities of the second class to levy tax for light and water funds.

House bill 38 by Mr. Gilman appropriating \$1,000 a year for the state school at the state penitentiary.

Senate bill 334 by Malone, permitting townships to levy a tax for the payment of outstanding judgments for damages.

Senate bill 334 by Price of Clark, authorizing second class cities to levy taxes to pay for land taken for opening or widening streets.

The senate killed the Gay bill providing for the payment of additional clerk hire to county clerks who discharge the duties of county assessors.

THEY AGREE ON IT

Mortgage Registration Tax Bill Thru Conference Committee.

In All Probability This Measure Will Become a Law.

Conferees of the house and senate today agreed on compromise provisions of a mortgage registration tax bill and it is probable that the measure will become a law before the close of the week. Concessions were made on the part of both house and senate concerning the registration fee and the committee recommended a fee of fifty cents a hundred dollars on each mortgage.

As passed by the senate, the registration tax bill provided for a recording fee of ten cents on each one hundred dollars. The house amended the bill to provide for a fee of twenty cents a hundred dollars. The house also inserted a provision limiting the total recording tax in any one instance to \$2,000. The conferees agreed to this latter provision and compromised on the tax.

When the report of the conference committee was read in the house this afternoon, the conferees agreed that action was deferred until Wednesday morning. Copies of the report will be printed and distributed before final action is taken. If the house and senate concur, the measure will soon become a law. If they fail to approve the work of the committee, another conference will be asked.

KILLED CATTLE TODAY

Discased Herd Valued at \$20,000 Is Slaughtered—No New Cases.

ElDorado, Kan., March 1.—Four hundred and eighty-nine steers, 80 hogs and five bulls, afflicted with foot and mouth disease, were killed on a farm 12 miles northeast of this town today.

They were owned by J. L. Hurd of Center, Colo. The carcasses were loaded on 30,000 pounds of quick lime in a ditch 600 feet long, 18 feet wide and eight feet deep. Rifles were used by the federal authorities to dispatch the animals.

No new cases of the foot and mouth disease were reported in the state today. Reports received by state officials from the southern part of the state are to the effect that the situation in that district is well under control.

GERMANS HALTED

Drive Into Poland Checked by Russian Reinforcements.

The Kaiser's Forces Are Being Rolled Back to Border.

Petrograd, March 1.—From the Niemen to Mlava, Von Hindenberg's drive toward the Warsaw-Petrograd railroad has been halted. The German forces are being rolled back upon the Prussian frontier under the tremendous pressure of the reinforced Russian army, along a battle line of a scant 20 miles inside the border of Poland. West of Pzrasnysz a violent engagement is in progress, according to dispatches received here today.

The rear guard of Von Hindenberg's right wing is fiercely resisting the Russian advance, covering the retreat of the main German body upon Mlava. The most severe fighting is along the narrow roads, and it is admitted that the German artillery has inflicted heavy losses on the advancing troops of the czar.

The German left wing has suffered heavily in the fighting west of Niemen, near Sopockino. Several bodies of Germans advancing through the swamps of Augustof have been slaughtered by fresh Russian forces from Grodno.

Thousands of German wounded are dying in the marshy lake region northwest of Grodno.

The Germans are making desperate efforts against the fortress of Ostrowitz. The reports from the front state that the 42 centimeter guns have been brought up by the enemy and are being put into position to shell the fortress.

TRICK OF THE WAR.

Earl Kitchener Started Story About Russian Troops in England.

London, March 1.—The famous hoax of the first weeks of war, when a body of Russian soldiers said to number from 100,000 to 200,000 was reported to have circled around Archangel, landed in Scottish ports and been shipped through at night to reinforce the British force in France, originated with Lord Kitchener himself according to a statement made by a British officer to a correspondent of the Daily Dispatch.

It is a noteworthy fact that although the myth spread like wildfire through the United Kingdom, with any number of witnesses to swear they had seen and talked to the Russians in their native language, the press bureau did not issue an official contradiction for a long period. The Russian story says the British officer was assigned to impress the German commanders in Belgium and northern France and to keep them in fear of a surprise either in the rear or on the eastern flank. The Russian purpose, for this dread was real among the German staff and accounts to some extent for the retreat of General von Kluck from Paris.

To give color to the report, Lord Kitchener is said to have caused a hundred transports laden with sundry goods to be sent from Scottish ports to Archangel after insuring them in Holland. When the British troops were moved from various points in Scotland and the north of England to the channel ports, he ordered the blinds of the trains to be lowered so as to arouse popular curiosity and speculation.

LABOR BILL UP.

House Considers Revision Workmen's Compensation Measure.

Revision of the workmen's compensation act is under consideration in the house this afternoon and it is probable that the afternoon session will be occupied with a discussion of the bill by the house labor committee. The committee bill makes numerous drastic changes in the present law and is regarded as the most important bit of labor legislation before the law makers at this session.

Included in the committee bill is a schedule of damages to be allowed workmen for injuries through loss of hand, foot, eye, finger or other member. Provision for medical treatment is also provided in the bill and a slap is taken at the "sneak" lawyer through a provision seeking to enforce direct settlement between the employer and employee. Friends of the measure have declared the amended bill the best compensation act passed by any state.

STOPPED ALL JITNEYS

With a Nickel in His Hand, Californian Held Up Traffic.

San Francisco, March 1.—The traffic policeman was off the job and pedestrians who crossed Market street were taking their lives in their hands. Jitney buses were speeding on without thought of the foot passengers.

Willis Polk of New York and San Francisco, an architect, wanted to cross. Here was his method: He stepped briskly to the curbstone, extracted a nickel from his pocket, held it aloft and looked like a customer. Every Jitney bus stopped. Polk walked safely across the street.
