Chas. H. Rhodes, Noted Poultry Judge Is Dead.

Boyce Forbes Leaves Kiro Mercantile Company.

Charles H. Rhodes, considered one of the best poultry judges in the United States, died Saturday night at the family home, 1123 West Sixth street. Death was caused from heart failure. Until a few weeks ago Mr. Rhodes lived at 925 North Quincy street, where they had resided for the past twenty-seven years.

It is with sorrow and regret that his many friends learn of his death. At the state and county fairs of Kansas, Mr. Rhodes was a well known figure in the poultry circles.

The deceased was a brother-in-law of Dr. L. A. Ryder and Mrs. A. P. Goodhue of Kansas City, Mo. Saturday evening Mrs. Rhodes died at the home of Dr. Ryder, leaving about 9 o'clock. Upon arriving at their home he remarked he was not feeling well, and a short time after he died.

The funeral will be held Tuesday afternoon from the chapel of Conwell's Undertaking parlors. Interment in Rochester cemetery.
